World AIDS Day December 1, 2012



The following information may be read on the morning or afternoon announcements to recognize World AIDS Day (December 1^{st}) 2012.

The 25th commemoration of World AIDS Day on December 1st draws people together from around the world in solidarity to pay tribute to the millions of people who have lost their lives to AIDS, show compassion for those living with HIV/AIDS, raise awareness of the global impact of HIV/AIDS, and celebrate victories that are allowing more people to live longer and healthier lives.

This year's theme, "Getting to Zero," is about reducing new HIV infections, discrimination and AIDS related deaths to zero through increased advances and equal access to HIV prevention, testing, treatment, and care.

According to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

- There are 56,300 new infections annually in the United States.
- The Miami, FL Region (which includes Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach counties) ranks #1 in the country in the rate of new HIV cases and the rate of new AIDS cases.
- Half of all new US infections occur in youth under the age of 25.

While these statistics are grim, HIV is 100% preventable and you can take precautions to protect yourself from becoming infected. You have the power to prevent it. Show compassion for those who have been infected. Get the facts about HIV, Get tested, and Get to Zero.
