CONSENT ITEM

- The Board approved development of this revised Policy at the development reading on November 5, 2008.
- The revised policy provides for the School District's acceptance of international students through the US Department of State exchange visitors programs under which foreign national secondary school students are afforded the opportunity for up to one year study while living with an American host family.
- The revised policy also provides a process for School District students' participation in international exchange students programs, based upon a decision of the student and the student's parents or guardians. See Paragraph 4.
- The revised policy provides definitions consistent with federal laws for the sponsoring organization, sponsor, local representative, and J-1 Visa exchange student. See Paragraph 2.
- For an organization to be a sponsoring organization, the revised policy provides the organization must be a 501 (c) (3) tax exempt organization and listed officially with the Council of Standards for International Educational Travel, an organization approved by the US Department of State for the School District. See Paragraph 3A.
- The revised policies outlines responsibilities for the sponsoring organization which include ensuring the prospective international exchange student has fulfilled all requirements to obtain the required J-1 Visa; obtaining a host family placement and completing the federally required background check of the host family members; securing required information from the prospective international exchange student's high school; obtaining clearance from the School District by providing certain documented evidence; and assuming responsibility for the international exchange student's health, safety, educational financial and legal obligations. See Paragraph 3B.
- An acceptance process for a prospective international exchange student provides the student may not request or require a diploma from the School

District, but affords the student all rights and responsibilities accorded other students in the School District. The process also requires the school principal to approve the admission of the student, as the student is to be assigned within the regular school attendance boundary of the host family's residence.
