- The revision would eliminate certain portions to coincide with subsequent statutory amendments (lines 7-12 and 24-31 and section (2)). The revision would also update statutory references and some terminology.

POLICY 7.134

ENCOURAGING LARGE SCHOOLS TO SUBDIVIDE INTO SCHOOLS-WITHIN-A-SCHOOL

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- 4 recognizes acknowledges the Florida School Board Legislature's 5 determination that, to reduce the anonymity of students in large schools, the 6 School Board shall adopt a policy that encourages the subdivision of large schools 7 into schools-within-a-school, findings that small schools can be created within 8 existing schools without increasing administrative and construction costs, and that 9 smaller schools may provide benefits of reduced discipline problems, truancy, and 10 gang participation; reduced dropout rates; improved teacher and student attitudes, student self-perception, and academic achievement; and increased parental 11 12 involvement.
- 2. Pursuant to Fla. Stat. § 235.2157(2), a school on a single campus which operates as a school-within-a-school, as defined by section (3) below, shall be considered a "small school" if each unit located on the single campus falls below the student-population limits listed in paragraphs (4)(a)-(e) of this Policy.
- 3. <u>2.</u> The term "school-within-a-school" shall be defined as an *operational program* that uses flexible scheduling, team planning, and curricular and instructional innovation to organize groups of students with groups of teachers as smaller units, so as to functionally operate as a smaller school.
- 4. <u>3.</u> As mandated by Fla. Stat. § 230.23(20) §§ 1001.42(20) and 1003.02(4), the School Board hereby adopts a policy of encouraging (but not requiring) schools to subdivide into "schools-within-a-school." for the 2002-2003 school year and thereafter, if such schools fall within the following categories:
- a. elementary schools with a student population of more than 500 students.
- b. middle schools with a student population of more than 700 students.
- c. high schools with a student population of more than 900 students.
- d. any school serving kindergarten through grade 8 with a student population of more than 700 students.
- e. any school serving kindergarten through grade 12 with a student population of more than 900.
- 5. <u>4.</u> A school-within-a-school shall operate within <u>existing resources</u>, as required by Fla. Stat. § 230.23(20) <u>1003.02(4)</u>.

- 6. <u>5.</u> When planning for and implementing a school-within-a-school, the school principal shall advise and counsel with the Area Superintendent and School Advisory Council to develop a program patterned after one of the following models set forth in Fla. Stat. § <u>230.23(20)</u> <u>1003.02(4)</u>, or a similar model:
 - a. An organizational arrangement assigning both student and teachers to small units in which the students take some or all of their coursework with cohorts in this group <u>their fellow grouped students</u> and from the teachers assigned to this smaller unit. A unit may be grouped together for either one (1) year or on a vertical, multiyear basis.
 - b. An organizational arrangement similar to that described in paragraph (5)(a), with the additional variations in instruction and curriculum. The smaller unit usually seeks to maintain a program different from that of the larger school, or of other smaller units. It may be vertically organized, but is dependent upon the school principal for its existence, budget, and staff. The District's career-education centers programs and career academies may be an examples of this model.
- 50 c. A separate and autonomous smaller unit formally authorized by the school 51 board or superintendent. The smaller unit plans and runs its own program, 52 has its own staff and students, and receives its own separate budget. The 53 smaller unit must negotiate the use of common space with the larger school 54 and defer to the building principal on matters of safety and building operation
- 7. <u>6.</u> Unless otherwise specifically authorized by the School Board, when a school-within-a-school is created, the school principal shall maintain oversight of all portions of the school site, consistent with School Board Policy 1.014 and Fla. Stat. § 231.085 §§ 1012.28 and 1001.54, although the immediate supervision of the smaller unit may be delegated to another administrator.
- 8. <u>7.</u> The establishment of a school-within-a-school will be carried out consistent with Article IX of the Classroom Teachers Association Collective Bargaining Agreement, or other applicable collective bargaining Agreement, if said Article or Agreements are deemed applicable.
