Development CONSENT ITEM

- This revision will allow the school facilities space to meet the educational needs of all students while complying with statutory and local regulations by establishing procedures to allow deviations from and exceptions to the Educational Plant Survey.
- This revision also updates statutory references.

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PROGRAM CAPACITY

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3 1. Purpose. -- To allow the school facilities space to meet the educational needs of 4 all students while complying with statutory and local regulations by establishing 5 procedures to allow deviations from and exceptions to the Educational Plant 6 Survey. The scope of the deviation from approved standards for determining 7 space needs and the exception to the recommendations in the educational plant 8 survey are set forth below. Pursuant to Fla. Stat. § 1003.62(2), this Policy 9 implements Waiver # 2 under charter district status, approved by the State Board 10 of Education ("SBE") on January 21, 2003, providing exemption from specified aspects of Fla. Stat. §§ 1013.03(10)(a) and 1013.72 and the SBE rules 11 12 implementing those statutes, concerning program capacity. The Policy should be 13 revised as necessary to maintain consistency with the Charter School District 14 Contract with the SBE and should be repealed if charter district status is not 15 renewed. The scope of the exemption and the practices authorized to replace the 16 waived statutory requirements are set forth below, substantially as presented to the 17 SBE.

- 18 2. Deviations and Exceptions Allowing Program Capacity-- Pursuant to Fla. Stat. 19 § 1013.31(1)(b)(5), the Educational Facilities Plan may include space needs that 20 deviate from approved standards for determining space needs if the deviation is 21 justified by the district and approved by the department or the Board of Governors, as appropriate, as necessary for the delivery of an approved educational program. 22 23 Additionally, pursuant to Fla. Stat. § 1013.32, an exception to the recommendations in the educational plant survey may be allowed if a board 24 25 considers that it will be advantageous to the welfare of the educational system or 26 that it will make possible a substantial saving of funds.
- 27 3. **Rationale for the Deviations and the Exemption Exceptions.**-- Fla. Stat. §§ 1013.03(10)(a) and 1013.72 would normally requires the District to prepare an 28 29 educational plant survey and whereby it must undergo a review to verify that student station and auxiliary facility space allocations do not exceed the limits 30 31 provided by this chapter Fla. Stat. Chapter 1013, and related rules, and to compare total capital outlay full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment projections in the survey 32 33 with Department of Education ("DOE") projections. Under current formulas, spaces 34 used for essential special programs are counted by the DOE as regular 35 instructional space, thereby limiting the District's ability to construct adequate 36 school facilities to meet growth in specific geographic areas and to meet program 37 needs. As a result, these formulas do not allow enough space for the many special 38 programs in the District's schools. Some examples An example of the programs a 39 program includes:

- 40a.English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL): In some neighborhoods, a41higher than state-average number of ESOL programs is needed to serve the42school population. Many ESOL students require an intensive program with a43lower teacher-pupil ratio in a "pull-out" setting (typically in resource rooms).44To meet this student instructional need in some schools, there would be45competing uses for resource rooms in schools whose actual usage of resource46rooms is much higher than currently recognized by the State.
- 47 b. Parent Involvement: A primary focus of several federally sponsored and mandated programs in the public school system is parent involvement and 48 49 parent literacy. At times implementation of parent involvement programs 50 requires that non-students (parents and young children) use space during the 51 daytime to receive program services. In some schools these types of 52 programs are critical to the success of their students. Because DOE formulas 53 would not currently allow space to be set aside for this purpose, space used in 54 this way would count towards permanent classroom space.
- 55 4. Deviations and Exceptions to the Educational Plant Survey. Approved 56 Alternative Practice -- The School Board will determine space needs at the local 57 level, based on local projections and program needs. The District will continue to 58 use Florida Inventory of School Houses (FISH) as the baseline reporting measure. 59 The District will provide for Board-approved deviations from the baseline, based on special programs in a school. The District will also follow the requirements of the 60 61 Interlocal Agreement for School Concurrency. The primary funding source for 62 deviations from use of the FISH baseline will be locally supported alternative 63 funding, currently Certificates of Participation.
- 64 5. Criteria. -- The District will conform to the criteria contained in the Interlocal Agreement for School Concurrency, signed by 26 27 cities, the County and the 65 66 School Board. The measurement of utilization will be based on the School Boardapproved space needs of the following programs: ESOL, ESE, Pre-K, parent 67 68 involvement programs, Title I-related programs, and other Board-approved special 69 programs offered at a school. Annual space utilization surveys will also be 70 conducted to assess use of space at each school. For example, schools with high 71 ESOL populations have significant space facility needs in order to provide the 72 appropriate instructional program for their students, and the alternative practice will 73 enable the instructional space used by ESOL students to be measured based on 74 actual use. The Program Capacity for each school will generally be determined as 75 follows:
- 76a.For schools that have a School Board-approved Educational Specification, the77Program Capacity listed on the Educational Specification will be used.
- 58 b. For schools without a Board-approved Educational Specification, the FISH capacity for the school will be multiplied by .85 to allow for program needs at

80 <u>the school.</u>

- 81 6. Impact on Students and Advantages to the Educational System .-- The waiver 82 deviations from and exceptions to the Educational Plant survey for program 83 capacity will enable the District to utilize school space to meet the specific needs of All of the programs listed above are essential to the 84 the school population. 85 academic success of students. Additionally, by allowing the District to construct 86 additional instructional space, this waiver these deviations and exceptions is are consistent with and support the goals and objectives of Constitutional Amendment 87 88 #9 for reduction of class size.
- 89 7. Monitoring and Reporting.-- The School Board will receive a reporting chart each 90 spring <u>fall</u> showing compliance with concurrency level of service and capacity 91 utilization percentage at each school, as well as FISH capacity <u>and program</u> 92 <u>capacity</u>. District staff will also prepare the annual reports required by the School 93 Concurrency Interlocal Agreement. <u>As required by Fla. Stat. § 1013.32, " a board</u> 94 <u>upon determining that an exception is warranted, must present a full statement, in</u> 95 <u>writing, setting forth all the facts to the Commissioner of Education".</u>
