POLICY 5.1812

4-B I recommend the Board adopt the proposed revisions to Policy 5.1812, entitled "Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students."

Adoption

CONSENT ITEM

- The Board approved this proposed new Policy as a first reading on December 2, 2002.
- The Rule Development Notice was advertised on Nov. 25, 2002; and the Rule Adoption Notice was advertised on December 16, 2002.
- Following the September 30 meeting, principals expressed overwhelming support for maintaining the notice at the foot of the matrix: "The Matrix provides MINIMUM mandatory actions for each incident. More severe consequences may be imposed at the discretion of the administrator." Notably, the matrix is not intended to provide maximum consequences like criminal sentencing maximums. Rather, it sets a minimum standard to ensure that students receive at least the mandatory minimum consequences.
- Florida law gives principals wide discretion to recommend expulsion:

The <u>principal</u> or the principal's designee may recommend to the district school superintendent the <u>expulsion</u> of any student who has committed a serious breach of conduct, including, but <u>not limited to</u>, <u>willful disobedience</u>, open defiance of authority of a member of his or her staff, violence against persons or property, or any other act which substantially disrupts the orderly conduct of the school.

FLA. STAT. § 1006.09(1)(c).

- This Policy is intended to coordinate with Policy 5.1814, "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts," adopted by the Board on Dec. 2, 2002.
- Based on the Board's discussion at the Aug. 21st regular Board meeting, this
 version proposes to allow possession of cellular phones, while continuing the
 prohibition on their use. See lines 280-293. (Both use and possession of
 pagers/beepers must remain prohibited, per state law.)
- At the first readings for development on June 17 and July 8, the School Board requested several amendments. Amendments based on the Board's discussion are described in the first part of the Executive Summary.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a brief summary of the recommended changes including rationale for the changes to <u>Policy 5.1812</u> – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students – and <u>Policy 5.1813</u> – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students. (Once these policies are approved, then <u>Policy 5.1811</u> – Student Code of Conduct Terms, will need to be updated to reflect the minor definitional changes and provide consistency between the policies.)

Additions to the Body of the Policy Text

In view of the Board's discussion on August 21, Code 21, Level 1, "Articles Disruptive to School" may be revised to allow possession, but not use, of cell phones. (Lines 280-293.) Accordingly, in Code 21 "Prohibited Items, Non-Criminal," cell phones would be removed from the list of prohibited items. However, pages/beepers remain prohibited by state law.

Note: If students possess a cellular phone, it should be turned off and kept inside a book bag, purse, or similar container, and it may not be used (and may not be allowed to emit any ringtone or other noise) on school grounds or during any school-sponsored program or activity, including school transportation.)

In view of the Board's discussion on In-school Suspension, the following sentence has been added to the text at lines 25-28:

<u>For incidents that do not require an Out-of-School Suspension, schools should utilize In-School</u> Suspension (ISS) wherever possible as an alternative to an Out-of-School Suspension.

Code **06** (Written Communication to the Parent/Guardian) is <u>not on the matrix</u>. Instead of adding it to the Matrix, the following sentence has been added to the text of the Policy at lines 52-54:

Additionally, every reasonable effort should be made to inform the parent(s)/guardian(s) of discipline incidents involving their children.

The Board discussed expulsion for serious verbal assaults and sexual harassment; thus, <u>an "A" has been added to the expulsion column</u> of the matrix for codes **32** (Repetitive Bullying, Harassing, Intimidating, or Threatening Behaviors) and **45** (Sexual Harassment). However, the <u>length</u> of expulsions is better regulated in a separate Policy (5.1814) that is being proposed on that subject under the title "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts."

The Board discussed making expulsion under for Code **57** (Physical Aggression on a School Board Employee) and **96** (Battery on a School Board Employee) be without possibility of early reinstatement. However, it would be more appropriate to regulate <u>length</u> of expulsions in a separate Policy (5.1814) that is being proposed on that subject under the title "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts."

New Incident Codes

Level 3 - # 57 – Physical Aggression on School Board Employee (volitional act; not accidental)
 <u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; some of the physically aggressive acts by students were coded as a Level 4 Battery on School Board Employee even though the staff member did not want to press charges against the student for battery. The Level 4 code mandates a recommendation for expulsion.

Many of these events required serious disciplinary consequences, but did not rise to the level of a recommendation for expulsion. (See lines 514-21.)

<u>Example 1</u>: Student pushes a teacher out of the way...teacher chooses not to press charges

<u>Example 2</u>: 3rd grade student pushes a teacher; the teacher presses charges; but mandatory expulsion *may not* be the most appropriate option for this student.

- Level 3 # 67 Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident (Lines 580-89)
 <u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; several schools requested a Level 3 category to capture counterfeit money and other major incidents that didn't fit other categories.
- Level 4 # 91 Possession of a Handgun (Lines 749-54)

<u>Rationale</u>: State requires reporting of handguns separately from firearms. A code for firearms currently exists. This code will allow schools to report weapons more accurately.

Revised Incident Codes

Level 1 - # 21 – Prohibited Items, non-criminal (Lines 297-303)
 Expanded definition to include <u>unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter mild</u>
 pain medication (or the child's own prescription medication) without parent approval and

<u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; Though very similar language currently exists in the Level 3 - # 71 Unauthorized Possession or <u>Mis</u>use of Prescription Medication, concerns were expressed about the mandatory 10-day suspension for legitimately using the over-the-counter medication (<u>or the child's own prescription medication</u>), yet circumventing the school's process for registering and dispensing medication. This addition allows Principals the

Level 3 - # 71 – Unauthorized Possession or <u>Mis</u>use of Prescription Medication (Lines 592-98)
 Expanded definition to specify another person's prescription medication, or misuse of one's own; also clarifies relationship to mild over-the-counter pain medications listed in Code 21. This amendment focuses on deterring illegal possession/misuse of prescription medication that was not prescribed for the student, as well as unlawful or dangerous misuse of the student's own prescription medication.

discretion when evaluating an event of this type.

New Action Codes

• Prevention Consequences - # 13 – Parent/Guardian Contact by a Language Facilitator (NOTE: <u>this</u> code does **NOT appear on the Matrix**, because it is included within the "PC" column).

<u>Rationale</u>: Provides a code for a parental contact by a language facilitator in the event of a language barrier.

• Early Intervention Consequences - # 25 – Referral to School CORE Team

<u>Rationale</u>: A code added after the policy was approved to assist in providing services for students through the school CORE Team. (This was <u>added to the</u> Matrix.)

Disciplinary Consequences - # 50 – Alternative to Suspension for Student Misconduct
 <u>Rationale</u>: A newly developed Alternative to Suspension program needs a separate code to distinguish it from the other Alternative to Suspension programs.
 (This was added to the Matrix.)

Disciplinary Consequences - # 88 – Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance
 <u>Rationale</u>: The discipline committee recommended a suspension code to address additional suspension days for non-completion of alternative to suspension programs. (NOTE: This is <u>NOT on the Matrix</u>, because it does not arise from a new incident; it is connected to the original incident.)

Proposed Revisions to Elementary Matrix of Incidents and Actions

• Many of the necessary minor adjustments to each of the matrices are comprised of oversights in the original policy as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee. The majority of the adjustments address the addition of an "A" (Additional Actions) for some of the codes. The most significant change involves the elementary matrix consequences for Drug, Alcohol, and Tobacco violations. The original policy provided consequences (and alternatives to suspensions) identical to the secondary policy. However, the agencies involved in the Alternative to Suspension programs for Drugs, Alcohol, and Tobacco do not generally target younger children. Therefore, the consequences for the elementary matrix was adjusted as follows:

1st Offense Drug or Alcohol (Codes 71-75 ONLY) Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials or parent conference.

Repeated Drug or Alcohol Violation REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School suspension AND Recommendation for Expulsion.

- **1**st **Offense Tobacco Violation** REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials or parent conference.
- **2nd Offense Tobacco Violation** REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory in-school intervention.
- **3rd Offense Tobacco Violation** Students may be given as opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension.

Repeated Tobacco Violations REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspensions.

Rationale: The Alternative to Suspension program providers target secondary students and are not prepared to address younger children. The Prevention Center has materials for the schools to utilize for elementary students as an alternative to suspension. The focus is on interventions and "getting help" rather than on purely punitive measures such as suspensions.

PROPOSED REVISED POLICY 5.1812

OPERATIONAL PROCEDURES FOR INCIDENTS AND ACTIONS FOR ELEMENTARY STUDENTS

I. Overview

A. The matrix of incidents and actions which is found at the conclusion of this policy, is a tool administrators will utilize to issue consequences for misbehavior by secondary students. The purpose of the matrix is to create a consistent, district-wide disciplinary system by identifying specific actions that correspond to a given incident. Administrators will be able to reduce some of the subjectivity in their decision-making and reference a district Board pPolicy that requires minimum mandatory consequences. These district-required minimum actions will assist administrators in communicating with parents, students, staff, and school personnel regarding discipline issues.

B. If the matrix of incidents and actions is utilized effectively and consistently, the focus of the discipline data generated should shift from the consequences of students' behavior and move toward the behaviors that result in those consequences. For example, instead of focusing on the number of suspensions, we would begin to address the incidents that generate those suspensions. Schools would then explore opportunities to implement programs/ initiatives/ strategies and then would provide assistance for school staff. For incidents that do not require an Out-of-School Suspension, schools should utilize In-School Suspension wherever possible as an alternative to an Out-of-School Suspension.

 C. The School Board recognizes that the matrix of incidents and actions must be construed to be consistent with the Individuals with Disability Education Act ("IDEA") and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act ("Section 504"). Therefore, students eligible for services under the IDEA or Section 504, will be disciplined in accordance with these Acts and are governed by those School Board Policies which specify that they apply to students covered under IDEA and 504.

II. Using the Matrix

A. When a student commits an infraction, the misbehavior is classified according to the definition(s) that best describe the event. The action(s) to be taken by the administrator are outlined in the matrix of incidents and actions. To identify the

appropriate action(s), locate the cells found at the intersection of the incident (rows) and action codes which are identified by the numbers at the top of the column. The actions represented by the codes are listed in the box to the right of the matrix. Minimum mandatory consequences (actions which MUST be imposed as a minimum consequence for first time offenses) are indicated by an "X." Additional consequences (those actions from which an administrator MAY ADDITIONALLY choose to impose for more serious or repeated actions) are indicated by an "A." Mandatory actions (those actions which MUST be imposed) are indicated by an "M." By providing a minimum mandatory consequence with additional options for all of the incidents, an administrator can address the severity of the incident with the actions imposed. Additionally, every reasonable effort should be made to inform the parent(s)/guardian(s) of discipline incidents involving their children.

Trespassing

To enter or remain on a public school campus, school board facility, or at a school district sponsored activity without authorization after being directed to leave by the chief administrator/designee of the facility, campus, or function.

Code 82 False Fire/911 Call

Whoever, without reasonable cause, by outcry or the ringing of bells, or otherwise makes or circulates, or causes to be made or circulated, a false alarm of fire or 911 call.

Code 83 Bomb Threat

Intentionally making a false report to any person, including school personnel, concerning the placement of any bomb, dynamite, explosive, or arson-causing device.

Code 84 Inappropriate, Lewd or Obscene Act

The use of oral or written language, electronic messages, pictures, objects, gestures, or engaging in any physical act considered to be offensive, socially unacceptable, or not suitable for an educational setting. Included in this category are indecent exposure (exposure of private body parts to the sight of another person in a lewd or indecent manner in a public place), and obscenity (conduct which by the community standards is deemed to corrupt public morals by its indecency and/or lewdness such as phone calls or other communication; unlawful manufacture, publishing, selling, buying or possessing materials such as literature or photographs).

Code 85 **Sexual Misconduct**

Engaging in a sex act or physical conduct of a sexual nature; the unlawful sexual intercourse, sexual contact or other unlawful behavior or conduct intended to result in sexual gratification without force or threat and where the victim is capable of giving consent.

Code 86 Possession of a Knife

The possession of any knife that may inflict harm on another person, or could be used to intimidate another person, including, but not limited to, fixed blade knives, folding knives, switch blade knives, razor knives, box cutters. (*Note*: If a weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry AND disciplinary action may increase substantially..)

Code 87

Possession of Other Potentially Dangerous Items

Any instrument or object, other than firearms, handguns, or knives, that could be deliberately used to inflict harm on another person, or could be used to intimidate any person. Included in this category are BB-guns and toy or replica guns represented as real guns. Also, included in this category are the possession or storage of items which are prohibited at school, including, but not limited to ammunition clips, bullets or cartridges, flammable liquids, combustible materials, matches, lighters, poisonous substances, mace, pepper spray, and any other items which may result in injury. (*Note*: If a weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry AND disciplinary action may increase substantially.)

FS Felony Suspension Act

This incident code should be used for a student who has been felony suspended per Florida Statute, and is assigned to an alternative program until the student is adjudicated. If the student is adjudicated guilty, the principal may recommend expulsion.

Level 4 - Criminal Incidents

718 Code 89

Threat of Violence, High Level

High level of threat is a threat that appears to pose an imminent and serious danger to the safety of others; the threat is direct, specific, and plausible; the threat suggests concrete steps have been taken toward carrying it out, for example, statements indicating that the threatener has acquired or practiced with a weapon or has had the victim under surveillance.

Code 90 **Possession of a Firearm**

Possession or sale of any firearm on school property, school sponsored transportation or during a school sponsored activity. A firearm is any weapon (including a starter gun) which will, is

designed to, or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive; the frame or receiver of any such weapon; any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; any destructive device; or any machine gun. The term firearm does not include an antique firearm unless the antique firearm is used in the commission of a crime. (*Note*: Fla. Stat. § 790.001(6)). A destructive device is any bomb, grenade, mine, rocket, missile, pipe bomb, or similar device containing some type of explosive that is designed to explode and is capable of causing bodily harm or property damage (Fla. Stat. § 790.001(4)). (Note: If a weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry.)

3. Code 91 Possession of a Handgun

Possession or sale of a handgun on school property, school-sponsored transportation, or during a school-sponsored activity. (NOTE: If a handgun is used during an incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry.)

<u>4.</u> Code 92 **Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of an Explosive Device (Not Firecrackers, Poppers)**

An explosive is any chemical compound or mixture that has the property of yielding readily to combustion or oxidation upon application of heat, flame, or shock, including but not limited to dynamite, nitroglycerin, trinitrotoluene, or ammonium nitrate when combined with other ingredients to form an explosive mixture, blasting caps, and detonators (Fla. Stat. §790.001(5)). *Note*: If an explosive devise is used during an incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry.)

<u>5.</u> Code 93 **Sale, Possession With Intent to Sell or Distribute, or Distribution of Drugs, Imitation Drugs Represented as Drugs, or Prescription Medications**

To sell or distribute any mood-modifying substance and/or dangerous substance listed in Chapter 893, Fla. Stat., including, but not limited to marijuana, hallucinogens, inhalants, as well as any substance represented to be an illegal substance, such as "designer drugs." or caffeine pills, tablets, or caplets, or any substance which is represented to be any such substance while on school district property, school transportation, or at a school related function.

<u>6.</u> Code 94 **Aggravated Battery**

Intentionally or knowingly causing great bodily harm, permanent disability, or permanent disfigurement or using a deadly weapon while committing a battery. A battery is the actual and intentional touching or striking of another person against his or her will or intentionally causing bodily harm to an individual (Fla. Stat. §§ 784.03 & 784.045).

7. Code 95 Armed Robbery

The taking of money or other property which may be the subject of larceny from the person or custody of another, with intent to either permanently or temporarily deprive the person or the owner of the money or other property, when in the course of the taking there is the use of force, violence, assault, or putting in fear; with the use of a firearm or other deadly weapon (Fla. Stat. § 812.13(1) & (2)(a)).

8. Code 96 Battery or Aggravated Battery on a School Board Employee

A battery or aggravated battery, as defined above, on any person that the student knows, or has reason to know, is an elected official or school district employee, whether it is committed on school property, on school sponsored transportation, during a school sponsored activity or while the elected official or employee is on official school business. (Fla. Stat. § 231.06 1006.13(4)).

9. Code 97 Sexual Battery (Attempted or Actual Forcible Penetration)

Forced oral, anal, or vaginal penetration by, or union with, the sexual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of another by any other object. (Fla. Stat. § 794.011(1)(h)).

10. Code 98 Kidnapping or Abduction

Forcibly, secretly, or by threat, confining, abducting, or imprisoning another person against their will and without lawful authority.

11. Code 99 Homicide - Murder

The unlawful killing of a human being (Fla. Stat. § 782.04); and manslaughter - the killing of a human being by the act, procurement, or culpable negligence of another, without lawful justification (Fla. Stat. § 782.07).

Repeated: REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspension and Recommendation for Expulsion.

Tobacco Violation

1st Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved alternative elementary program. REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension, and mandatory counseling materials or a parent conference.

2nd Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 2nd alternative elementary program. REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School Suspension, and mandatory counseling materials or a parent conference.

<u>3rd Offense</u> - Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 3rd alternative elementary <u>program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School</u> **Suspension**.

Repeated REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspension.

The minimum actions(s) that must be taken by Administrators/Disciplinarians are outlined in the Matrix of Incidents and Actions.
