- ◆ Development

CONSENT ITEM

- After a year of implementation of the new discipline coding system, some inevitable “tweaks” and minor changes have become necessary.
- The Palm Beach County School District discipline committee, chaired by Elizabeth Decker, has recommended a few new incident codes and action codes in addition to some minor definition and matrix changes that will assist in more accurately reflecting events as they occur at schools.
- Additionally, during the development of the discipline policies and the preparation of the training materials for the end users, several corrections and changes occurred. As a result, some of the documents (both policies and end user materials) have some minor inconsistencies.
- A few of the discipline code definitions need to be slightly modified to provide a clearer understanding of these incidents and the corresponding actions to be taken.
- The Elementary and Secondary matrices also need some “very minimal” updating to reflect some oversights in the original edition and clear up some inconsistencies as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee.
- **The following is a brief summary of the recommended changes:**

This is a brief summary of the recommended changes including rationale for the changes to Policy 5.1812 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students – and Policy 5.1813 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students. Once these policies are approved, then Policy 5.1811 – Student Code of Conduct Terms, will need to be updated to reflect the minor definitional changes and provide consistency between the policies.

**New Incident Codes**

- Level 3 - # 57 – Physical Aggression on School Board Employee  
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; Some of the physically aggressive acts by students were coded as a Level 4 Battery on School Board Employee EVEN THOUGH the staff member did not want to press charges against the student. The Level 4 code mandates a recommendation for expulsion. Many of these events required serious disciplinary consequences, but did not rise to the level of a recommendation for expulsion.  
Example 1: Student pushes a teacher out of the way...teacher chooses not to press charges

*Example 2:* 3<sup>rd</sup> grade student pushes a teacher; The teacher presses charges; Mandatory expulsion *may not* be the most appropriate option for this student.

- Level 3 - # 67 – Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident  
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; several schools requested a Level 3 category to capture counterfeit money and other major incidents that didn't fit other categories.
- Level 4 - # 91 – Possession of a Handgun  
Rationale: State requires reporting of handguns separately from firearms. A code for firearms currently exists. This code will allow schools to report weapons more accurately.

### Revised Incident Code

- Level 1 - # 21 – Prohibited Items, non-criminal  
Expand definition to include unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter *mild pain* medication without parent approval and school notification.  
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; Though very similar language currently exists in the Level 3 - # 71 *Unauthorized Possession or Use of Prescription Medication*, concerns were expressed about the mandatory 10-day suspension for legitimately using the over-the-counter medication, yet circumventing the school's process for medication. This addition allows Principals the discretion when evaluating an event of this type.

### New Action Codes

- Prevention Consequences - # 13 – Parent/Guardian Contact by a Language Facilitator  
Rationale: Provides a code for a parental contact by a language facilitator in the event of a language barrier.
- Early Intervention Consequences - # 25 – Referral to School CORE Team  
Rationale: A code added after the policy was approved to assist in providing services for students through the school CORE Team.
- Disciplinary Consequences - # 50 – Alternative to Suspension for Student Misconduct  
Rationale: A newly developed Alternative to Suspension program needs a separate code to distinguish it from the other Alternative to Suspension programs.
- Disciplinary Consequences - # 88 – Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance  
Rationale: The discipline committee recommended a suspension code to address additional suspension days for non-completion of alternative to suspension programs.

### Proposed Revisions to Elementary and Secondary Matrices of Incidents and Actions

- Many of the necessary minor adjustments to each of the matrices are comprised of oversights in the original policy as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee. The majority of the adjustments address the addition of an “A” (Additional Actions) for some of the codes. The most significant change involves the elementary matrix consequences for Drug, Alcohol, and Tobacco violations. The original policy provided consequences (and alternatives to suspensions) identical to the secondary policy. However, the agencies involved in the Alternative to Suspension programs for Drugs, Alcohol, and Tobacco do not generally target younger children. Therefore, the consequences for the elementary matrix was adjusted as follows:

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense Drug or Alcohol** (Codes 71-75 ONLY) Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

**Repeated Drug or Alcohol Violation** REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School suspension AND Recommendation for Expulsion.

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation** – REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation** – REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory in-school intervention.

**3<sup>rd</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation** – Students may be given as opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension.

**Repeated Tobacco Violations** REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspensions.

Rationale: The Alternative to Suspension program providers target secondary students and are not prepared to address younger children. The Prevention Center has materials for the schools to utilize for elementary students as an alternative to suspension. The focus is on interventions and “getting help” rather than on purely punitive measures such as suspensions.

8 I. Overview  
9

10 A. The matrix of incidents and actions which is found at the conclusion of this policy,  
11 is a tool administrators will utilize to issue consequences for misbehavior by  
12 secondary students. The purpose of the matrix is to create a consistent, district-wide  
13 disciplinary system by identifying specific actions that correspond to a given  
14 incident. Administrators will be able to reduce some of the subjectivity in their  
15 decision-making and reference a district policy that requires minimum mandatory  
16 consequences. These district-required minimum actions will assist administrators in  
17 communicating with parents, students, staff, and school personnel regarding  
18 discipline issues.

19  
20 B. If the matrix of incidents and actions is utilized effectively and consistently, the  
21 focus of the discipline data generated should shift from the consequences of  
22 students' behavior and move toward the behaviors that result in those  
23 consequences. For example, instead of focusing on the number of suspensions, we  
24 would begin to address the incidents that generate those suspensions. Schools  
25 would then explore opportunities to implement programs/ initiatives/ strategies and  
26 then would provide assistance for school staff.

27  
28 II. Using the Matrix  
29

30 A. When a student commits an infraction, the misbehavior is classified according to the  
31 definition(s) that best describe the event. The action(s) to be taken by the  
32 administrator are outlined in the matrix of incidents and actions. To identify the  
33 appropriate action(s), locate the cells found at the intersection of the incident (rows)  
34 and action codes which are identified by the numbers at the top of the column. The  
35 actions represented by the codes are listed in the box to the right of the matrix.

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1. The School Board of Palm Beach County recognizes that the matrix of incidents and actions must be construed to be consistent with the Individuals with Disability Education Act ("IDEA") and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act ("Section 504"). Therefore, students eligible for services under the IDEA or Section 504, will be disciplined in accordance with these Acts and are governed by those School Board policies which specify that they apply to students covered under IDEA and 504.

36 Minimum mandatory consequences (actions which MUST be imposed as a  
37 minimum consequence for first time offenses) are indicated by an "X." Additional  
38 consequences (those actions from which an administrator MAY ADDITIONALLY  
39 choose to impose for more serious or repeated actions) are indicated by an "A."  
40 Mandatory actions (those actions which MUST be imposed) are indicated by an  
41 "M." By providing a minimum mandatory consequence with additional options for  
42 all of the incidents, an administrator can address the severity of the incident with the  
43 actions imposed.

238 Written or verbal remarks or gestures that show a lack of respect,

240 demean, degrade, antagonize, or humiliate a person or group of

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- d. Code 17 **Bullying/Harassment**  
A person who uses power (physical, verbal, written, or psychological) for any reason in a willful manner with the intent of hurting or humiliating another individual for any reason including but not limited to age, gender, race, nationality, ethnicity, religion or sexual orientation.
  - e. Code 18 **Confrontation**  
A verbal confrontation, or the encouraging or inciting of a confrontation that has the propensity to escalate into a fight.
  - f. Code 19 **Lying/Misrepresentation**  
Intentionally providing false or misleading information to, or withholding valid information from, a school staff member.
  - g. Code 20 **Articles Disruptive to School**  
To possess, display or use anything that is disruptive to the general peace and welfare to a school center, school bus, or a school sponsored activity. (Refer to **Level 3 and Level 4** for weapons, drugs, alcohol, tobacco, obscene materials or other articles which may require law enforcement intervention.)
  - h. Code 21 **Prohibited items, Non-Criminal**  
Possession and/or use of items or contraband designated by the school as inappropriate materials such as portable paging devices, beepers, portable cellular telephones, portable cassette or CD players, electronic games, roller blades, skateboards, magic cards, lighters, hats, etc. AND any other items that cause distraction or damage to persons or property or otherwise interfere with the learning process. Unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter mild pain medication including but not limited to items such as aspirin, Advil, Aleve, Midol, NoDoze, and herbal supplements without parental approval AND school notification pursuant to Policy 5.321. (Refer to **Level 3 and Level 4** for weapons, drugs, alcohol, tobacco, obscene materials or other articles which may require law enforcement intervention.)
  - i. Code 22 **Unauthorized Sale/Distribution of Materials (Non-Criminal)**  
Unauthorized selling or distributing of materials; example: candy (**Note:** Items that are illegal or inappropriate, such as drugs,

283 weapons, pornography, etc., should be coded in a **Level 3**

287 Any activity that cannot be added in another **Level 1** incident that

296 Behavior that disrupts and/or distracts the driver from safely

324 physically aggressive act results in serious bodily injury and/or

329 Repeated referrals for Level 1 disruptive behaviors including  
330 disruptive play, disrespectful language, and any other repetitive

334 Repeated referrals for disobedience, defiance and

358 The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property

- g. Code 45 **Sexual Harassment (Undesired Sexual Behavior Towards Another)**  
Unwanted or repeated verbal or physical sexual behavior that is offensive and objectionable to the recipient, causes discomfort or humiliation or creates a hostile environment. Sexual harassment shall include but not be limited to creating a hostile environment. Sexually harassing conduct which can include unwelcome sexual advances; and other verbal, nonverbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature by an individual that is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive enough to create a hostile or abusive educational environment. (Note: In some cases, severe incidents of sexual harassment which includes physical contact may be considered a **Battery**; or with physical penetration, a **Sexual Battery**.)
- ~~h. Code 46 **Severe/Repetitive Inappropriate Activity**  
Any Level 2 type activity that is disruptive and/or inappropriate in a school setting that does not fit into another Level 2 category.~~

409 i.h. Code 47 **Menacing Statements**

410 A medium level of threat which is a threat which could be carried  
411 out, although it may not appear entirely realistic. The threat is  
412 more direct and more concrete than a low level threat; the  
413 wording in the threat suggests that the threatener has given some  
414 thought to how the act will be carried out; there may be a general  
415 indication of a possible place and time (though these signs still fall  
416 well short of a detailed plan); There is no strong indication that the  
417 threatener has taken preparatory steps, although there may be  
418 some veiled reference or ambiguous or inconclusive evidence  
419 pointing to the possibility; an allusion to a book or movie that  
420 shows the planning of a violent act, or a vague, general statement  
421 about the availability of weapons; there may be a specific  
422 statement seeking to convey that the threat is not empty: "I'm

424 Code 47 Severe or Repetitive Inappropriate Activity

425 Any Level 2-type activity that is disruptive and/or inappropriate  
426 in a school setting that does not fit into another Level 2 category.

427  
428 C. Level 3

429 1. Crimes Against Persons Incidents

430 a. Code 50 **Fighting**

431 Mutual participation in a hostile, physical encounter; mutual  
432 participation in an altercation involving physical violence.

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434 b. Code 51 **Verbal Assault on a Student/Person (Non-School Board  
435 Employee)**

436 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to  
437 another person, coupled with an apparent ability to do so, and  
438 doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in another person  
439 that violence is imminent.

440  
441 c. Code 52 **Verbal Assault on School Board Employee**

442 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to  
443 a school board employee, coupled with an apparent ability to do  
444 so, and doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in another  
445 person that violence is imminent.

446  
447 d. Code 53 **Physical Battery on a Student/Person (Non-School Board  
448 Employee)**

449 The willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the person  
450 of another. Three primary elements must be present for a Battery  
451 to occur: (1) there must be an aggressor, who (2) intended to  
452 cause physical harm, to (3) an another person. Includes an attack  
453 with a weapon that fits the aforementioned description. (**Note:**  
454 *This category should be used only when the attack is serious*  
455 *enough to warrant contacting law enforcement.*)  
456

457 e. Code 54 **To Attempt a Criminal Act Against a Person**

458 Any person who attempts to commit, or who solicits another to  
459 commit, or who agrees, conspires, combines, or confederates with  
460 another person or persons to commit the offense of a Battery,  
461 Robbery, Homicide, Kidnapping, or Sexual Battery against  
462 another person or persons, and in such attempt does any act  
463 toward the commission of such offense, but fails in the  
464 perpetration or is intercepted or prevented in the execution of the  
465 offense. (Florida Statutes § 774.04)  
466

467 f. Code 55 **Extortion/Blackmail/Coercion**

468 The use or threat or intimidation to obtain anything of value from  
469 another person, including, but not limited to, money. (**Note:**  
470 Minor offenses that do NOT require law enforcement should be  
471 coded as **Code 17 Bullying** or **Code 32 Repetitive Bullying,**  
472 **Harassing, Intimidating, or Threatening Behavior.**)  
473

474 g. Code 56 **Robbery**

475 The taking or attempting to take anything of value that is owned  
476 by another person or organization, under confrontational  
477 circumstances by force or threat of force or violence and/or by  
478 putting the victim in fear. A key difference between robbery and  
479 larceny is that a threat of battery is involved in robbery.  
480

481 **h. Code 57 Physical Aggression on a School Board Employee**

482 **A physically aggressive act such as pushing, pulling, or striking**  
483 **toward a School Board employee. Generally, the physical act**  
484 **does not result in injury. Law enforcement should be notified;**  
485 **criminal charges may or may not be filed. (NOTE: IF A**  
486 **RECOMMENDATION FOR EXPULSION IS PROPOSED, then the**  
487 **Level 4 code # 96, Battery on SBE, should be used.**  
488

489 2. Property Incidents  
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- a. Code 60 **Stealing More than Fifty Dollars (\$50)**  
The unlawful taking or concealing the property of another person, without threat, violence or bodily harm, with the intent to prevent or deprive the rightful owner of its use. This includes taking of property or taking property from a vehicle on school property.
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- b. Code 61 **Vandalism More than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) (Includes Materials and Labor)**  
The willful and/or malicious destruction, damage, or defacement of public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it. This category, which includes graffiti, should be coded when the amount of damage to the property, including materials and labor, exceeds one hundred dollars (\$100) to repair, remove, and/or replace. (**NOTE:** If the damage to the property, including materials and labor, is less than one hundred dollars (\$100). to repair, then the event should be coded as **Code 35 Abuse of School Property/Minor Vandalism** unless Law Enforcement files charges.)
- 510  
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- c. Code 62 **Breaking and Entering/Burglary (Illegal Entry into a Facility)**  
The unlawful entry with or without force into a building or other structure, remaining behind or conveyance with the intent to commit a crime to property.
- 515  
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- d. Code 63 **Computer Misuse/Inappropriate Use of E-mail/Internet**  
The inappropriate use of a computer, including, but not limited to, breaking into restricted accounts or networks, modifying, or destroying files without permission, illegally copying software, and entering or distributing or printing unauthorized files. Accessing or entering unauthorized internet sites; Distributing inappropriate electronic messages.
- 523  
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- e. Code 64 **Reckless Vehicle Use**  
The use of any motorized or self-propelled vehicle on school grounds in a reckless manner or so as to threaten the health, safety, welfare of others, or to disrupt the educational process.
- 528  
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- f. Code 65 **Motor Vehicle Theft**  
The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. *Examples:* theft of a car, truck, motorcycle, golf cart, dune buggy, RV or anything that is self-propelled.



533 g. Code 66 **Arson**  
534 To willfully and unlawfully, or while in the commission of any  
535 felony, by fire or explosion, damage or cause to be damaged: any  
536 dwelling, whether occupied or not, or its contents; any structure,  
537 or contents thereof, where persons are normally present; and any  
538 other structure that the person knew or had reasonable grounds to  
539 believe was occupied by a human being (Florida Statutes §  
540 806.01(1)(a)-(c)).

542 **h. Code 67 Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident**  
543 **To fashion or reproduce a document, money, or other items**  
544 **with the intent to defraud; includes counterfeit money or**  
545 **documents; Also, any Level 3-type incident that is inappropriate**  
546 **in a school setting and does not fit into another Level 3 category.**  
547 **Included in this category is culpable negligence, exposing**  
548 **another person to personal injury. (NOTE: Any incident in this**  
549 **category REQUIRES law enforcement intervention.)**

551 3. Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Incidents  
552 a. Code 70 **Possession/Use of Tobacco Products**  
553 Possession, use, sale, storage, or distribution of tobacco products  
554 on school district property. Tobacco products include, but are not  
555 limited to, cigarettes, cigars, snuff, dip, pipe tobacco, and chewing  
556 tobacco.

557  
558 b. Code 71 **Unauthorized Possession or Use of Prescription Medication**  
559 To possess, use, store, or be under the influence of any substance  
560 which requires a physician's prescription, or any over-the-counter  
561 medication without parental approval and school notification.

562  
563 c. Code 72 **Use of Intoxicants**  
564 The inhaling or ingestion of intoxicants, including but not limited  
565 to, glue, solvents, butane, and whip crème, for the purpose of  
566 obtaining a mood-modifying experience.

567  
568 d. Code 73 **Possession, Use, Manufacture, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of**  
569 **Alcohol or Intoxicating Beverages**  
570 The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture,  
571 sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of intoxicating  
572 alcoholic beverages. Use should be reported only if the person is  
573 caught in the act of using, or is discovered to have used in the  
574 course of the investigation.

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e. Code 74 **Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of Drug Paraphernalia**  
To possess, use, sale, store, or distribute any equipment, device, or equipment used for the purpose of preparing or taking drugs, including, but not limited to, items listed in Florida Statute § 893.145, and items which may be determined to be drug paraphernalia under the criteria set out in Florida Statute § 893.146.

f. Code 75 **Possession, Use, or Storage of Drugs or Imitation Drugs Represented as Drugs**  
To store, possess, purchase, use, or be under the influence of any mood-modifying substance and/or dangerous substance listed in Chapter 893, Florida Statutes, including, but not limited to, marijuana, hallucinogens, inhalants, as well as any substance represented to be an illegal substance, such as “designer drugs,” or caffeine pills, tablets, or caplets, or any substance which is represented to be any such substance while on school property or jurisdiction of the School District of Palm Beach County.

4. Disorderly Conduct/Weapons

a. Code 80 **Disruption of a School Function/Disorderly Conduct**  
Any act which substantially disrupts the orderly conduct of a school function, behavior which substantially disrupts the orderly learning environment or poses a threat to the health, safety, and/or welfare of students, staff, or others. An incident of this type is mandatory to be reported to law enforcement and is likely to result in an arrest.

b. Code 81 **Trespassing**  
To enter or remain on a public school campus, school board facility, or at a school function without authorization or invitation and with no lawful purpose for entry, including students under suspension or expulsion. To enter or remain on a public school campus, school board facility, or at a school district sponsored activity without authorization after being directed to leave by the chief administrator/designee of the facility, campus, or function.

c. Code 82 **False Fire/911 Call**

617                   Whoever, without reasonable cause, by outcry or the ringing of  
618                   bells, or otherwise makes or circulates, or causes to be made or  
619                   circulated, a false alarm of fire or 911 call.

621                   d. Code 83   **Bomb Threat**  
622                   Intentionally making a false report to any person, including school  
623                   personnel, concerning the placement of any bomb, dynamite,  
624                   explosive, or arson-causing device.

626                   e. Code 84   **Inappropriate, Lewd or Obscene Act**  
627                   The use of oral or written language, electronic messages, pictures,  
628                   objects, gestures, or engaging in any physical act considered to be  
629                   offensive, socially unacceptable, or not suitable for an educational  
630                   setting. Included in this category are indecent exposure (exposure  
631                   of private body parts to the sight of another person in a lewd or  
632                   indecent manner in a public place), and obscenity (conduct which  
633                   by the community standards is deemed to corrupt public morals  
634                   by its indecency and/or lewdness such as phone calls or other  
635                   communication; unlawful manufacture, publishing, selling,  
636                   buying or possessing materials such as literature or photographs).

639                   Engaging in a sex act or physical conduct of a sexual nature; the

645                   g. Code 86   **Possession of a Knife**  
646                   The possession of any knife that may inflict harm on another  
647                   person, or could be used to intimidate another person, including,  
648                   but not limited to, fixed blade knives, folding knives, switch blade  
649                   knives, razor knives, box cutters. (**Note:** If a weapon is used  
650                   during an incident, that incident should be coded including an  
651                   appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry AND  
652                   disciplinary action may increase substantially.)

654                   h. Code 87   **Possession of Other Potentially Dangerous Items**  
655                   Any instrument or object, other than firearms, handguns, or  
656                   knives, that could be deliberately used to inflict harm on another

658                   this category are BB-guns and toy or replica guns represented as

659 real guns. Also, included in this category are the possession or

703 **c. Code 91 Possession of a Handgun**  
704 **Possession or sale of a handgun on school property, school-**  
705 **sponsored transportation, or during a school-sponsored activity.**  
706 **(NOTE: If a handgun is used during an incident, that incident**  
707 **should be coded including an appropriate corresponding**  
708 **weapons-related entry.)**  
709

710 **d. Code 92 Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of an Explosive**  
711 **Device (Not Firecrackers, Poppers)**

712 An explosive is any chemical compound or mixture that has the  
713 property of yielding readily to combustion or oxidation upon  
714 application of heat, flame, or shock, including but not limited to  
715 dynamite, nitroglycerin, trinitrotoluene, or ammonium nitrate  
716 when combined with other ingredients to form an explosive  
717 mixture, blasting caps, and detonators (Florida Statute  
718 §790.001(5)). **Note:** If an explosive device is used during an  
719 incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate  
720 corresponding weapons-related entry.)

722 **e. Code 93 Sale, Possession With Intent to Sell or Distribute, or**

725 To sell or distribute any mood-modifying substance and/or

1st Offense (Codes 71-75 ONLY): Students may be given an opportunity to attend a District-approved alternative elementary program.

Repeated: **REQUIRE a 10-day** Out-of-School Suspension and Recommendation for Expulsion.

**Tobacco Violation**

1st Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved alternative elementary program.

2nd Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 2nd alternative elementary program.

3rd Offense - Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 3rd alternative elementary program.

Repeated REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspension.

**DIRECTIONS:** When a student has committed an infraction, the misbehavior is to be classified according to the definition(s) that best describes the event. The minimum action(s) that must be taken by Administrators/Disciplinarians are outlined in the Matrix of Incidents and Actions. (NOTE: If a school does not provide one of the prescribed minimum actions, then the next most appropriate action should be taken.)
