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# POLICY 5.1812

**5-B** I recommend the Board adopt the proposed revisions to Policy 5.1812, entitled "Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students," including amendments based on the Board's initial development discussion on June 17.

## • Further Development

- At the first reading for development on June 17, the School Board approved the proposed Policy, with suggested amendments.
- Amendments based on the Board's discussion are included on lines 24-26 and 482; and the parent-conference provisions on pages 33 and 39.
- The Legal Department recommended bringing back this amended text to the Board for further development to verify appropriate inclusion of the Board's requests.
- Upon approved on July 8, this Policy will be scheduled for final reading and recommendation for Adoption on August 19, in time for the opening of school on August 14.

# CONSENT ITEM

- After a year of implementation of the new discipline coding system, some inevitable "tweaks" and minor changes have become necessary.
- The Palm Beach County School District discipline committee, chaired by Elizabeth Decker, has recommended a few new incident codes and action codes in addition to some minor definition and matrix changes that will assist in more accurately reflecting events as they occur at schools.
- Additionally, during the development of the discipline policies and the preparation of the training materials for the end users, several corrections and changes occurred. As a result, some of the documents (both policies and end user materials) have some minor inconsistencies.
- A few of the discipline code definitions need to be slightly modified to provide a clearer understanding of these incidents and the corresponding actions to be taken.
- The Elementary matrix also need some "very minimal" updating to reflect some oversights in the original edition and clear up some inconsistencies as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee. A brief Executive Summary of the recommended changes follows:

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## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This is a brief summary of the recommended changes including rationale for the changes to <u>Policy 5.1812</u> – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students – and <u>Policy 5.1813</u> – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students. (Once these policies are approved, then <u>Policy 5.1811</u> – Student Code of Conduct Terms, will need to be updated to reflect the minor definitional changes and provide consistency between the policies.)

## **New Incident Codes**

• Level 3 - # 57 – Physical Aggression on School Board Employee

didn't fit other categories.

<u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; some of the physically aggressive acts by students were coded as a Level 4 Battery on School Board Employee even though the staff member did not want to press charges against the student for battery. The Level 4 code mandates a recommendation for expulsion. Many of these events required serious disciplinary consequences, but did not rise to the level of a recommendation for expulsion.

*Example 1*: Student pushes a teacher out of the way...teacher chooses not to press charges

<u>Example 2</u>:  $3^{rd}$  grade student pushes a teacher; the teacher presses charges; mandatory expulsion *may not* be the most appropriate option for this student.

- Level 3 # 67 Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident
   <u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; several schools requested a
   Level 3 category to capture counterfeit money and other major incidents that
- Level 4 # 91 Possession of a Handgun

<u>Rationale</u>: State requires reporting of handguns separately from firearms. A code for firearms currently exists. This code will allow schools to report weapons more accurately.

## **Revised Incident Codes**

• Level 1 - # 21 – Prohibited Items, non-criminal

Expand definition to include <u>unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter *mild pain* medication without parent approval and school notification.</u>

<u>Rationale</u>: Discipline committee recommendation; Though very similar language currently exists in the Level 3 - # 71 Unauthorized Possession or Use of *Prescription Medication*, concerns were expressed about the mandatory 10-day suspension for legitimately using the over-the-counter medication, yet circumventing the school's process for medication. This addition allows Principals the discretion when evaluating an event of this type.

### **New Action Codes**

• Prevention Consequences - # 13 – Parent/Guardian Contact by a Language Facilitator

<u>Rationale</u>: Provides a code for a parental contact by a language facilitator in the event of a language barrier.

- Early Intervention Consequences # 25 Referral to School CORE Team
  <u>Rationale</u>: A code added after the policy was approved to assist in providing
  services for students through the school CORE Team.
- Disciplinary Consequences # 50 Alternative to Suspension for Student Misconduct <u>Rationale</u>: A newly developed Alternative to Suspension program needs a separate code to distinguish it from the other Alternative to Suspension programs.
- Disciplinary Consequences # 88 Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance
   <u>Rationale</u>: The discipline committee recommended a suspension code to address
   additional suspension days for non-completion of alternative to suspension
   programs.

## **Proposed Revisions to Elementary Matrix of Incidents and Actions**

• Many of the necessary minor adjustments to each of the matrices are comprised of oversights in the original policy as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee. The majority of the adjustments address the addition of an "A" (Additional Actions) for some of the codes. The most significant change involves the elementary matrix consequences for Drug, Alcohol, and Tobacco violations. The original policy provided consequences (and alternatives to suspensions) identical to the secondary policy. However, the agencies involved in the Alternative to Suspension programs for Drugs, Alcohol, and Tobacco do not generally target younger children. Therefore, the consequences for the elementary matrix was adjusted as follows:

1<sup>st</sup> Offense Drug or Alcohol (Codes 71-75 ONLY) Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

**Repeated Drug or Alcohol Violation** REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School suspension AND Recommendation for Expulsion.

1<sup>st</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation – REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

2<sup>nd</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation – REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory in-school intervention.

**3<sup>rd</sup> Offense Tobacco Violation** – Students may be given as opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension.

Repeated Tobacco Violations REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspensions.

Rationale: The Alternative to Suspension program providers target secondary students and are not prepared to address younger children. The Prevention Center has materials for the schools to utilize for elementary students as an alternative to suspension. The focus is on interventions and "getting help" rather than on purely punitive measures such as suspensions.

A. When a student commits an infraction, the misbehavior is classified according to the definition(s) that best describe the event. The action(s) to be taken by the administrator are outlined in the matrix of incidents and actions. To identify the appropriate action(s), locate the cells found at the intersection of the incident (rows) and action codes which are identified by the numbers at the top of the column. The actions represented by the codes are listed in the box to the right of the matrix.

suspension programs (ISS), the Board's policy is that ISS should be used as the

suspension consequence for any incidents referring to "out of school suspension."

<sup>1.</sup> The School Board of Palm Beach County recognizes that the matrix of incidents and actions must be construed to be consistent with the Individuals with Disability Education Act ("IDEA") and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act ("Section 504"). Therefore, students eligible for services under the IDEA or Section 504, will be disciplined in accordance with these Acts and are governed by those School Board policies which specify that they apply to students covered under IDEA and 504.

<u>1st Offense</u> (Codes 71-75 ONLY): Students may be given an opportunity to attend a District-approved alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension, and mandatory counseling materials or a parent conference.

<u>Repeated</u>: **REQUIRE a 10-day** Out-of-School Suspension and Recommendation for Expulsion.

## **Tobacco Violation**

1st Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program. REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension, and mandatory counseling materials or a parent conference.

2nd Offense – Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 2nd alternative elementary program. **REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School** Suspension, and mandatory counseling materials or a parent conference.

<u>3rd Offense</u> - Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district-approved 3rd alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension.

Repeated REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspension.

**DIRECTIONS:** When a student has committed an infraction, the misbehavior is to be classified according to the definition(s) that best describes the event. The minimum actions(s) that must be taken by Administrators/Disciplinarians are outlined in the Matrix of Incidents and Actions.
