

POLICY 5.1813

5-C I recommend the Board adopt the proposed revisions to Policy 5.1813, entitled "Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students," including amendments based on the Board's initial development discussion on June 17.

◆ **Further Development**

- At the first reading for development on June 17, the School Board approved the proposed Policy, with suggested amendments.
- Amendments based on the Board's discussion are included on lines 26-28 and 484.
- The Legal Department recommended bringing back this amended text to the Board for further development to verify appropriate inclusion of the Board's requests.
- Upon approved on July 8, this Policy will be scheduled for final reading and recommendation for Adoption on August 19, in time for the opening of school on August 14.

CONSENT ITEM

- After a year of implementation of the new discipline coding system, some inevitable "tweaks" and minor changes have become necessary.
- The Palm Beach County School District discipline committee, chaired by Elizabeth Decker, has recommended a few new incident codes and action codes in addition to some minor definition and matrix changes that will assist in more accurately reflecting events as they occur at schools.
- Additionally, during the development of the discipline policies and the preparation of the training materials for the end users, several corrections and changes occurred. As a result, some of the documents (both policies and end user materials) have some minor inconsistencies.
- A few of the discipline code definitions need to be slightly modified to provide a clearer understanding of these incidents and the corresponding actions to be taken.
- The Secondary matrix also need some "very minimal" updating to reflect some oversights in the original edition and clear up some inconsistencies as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee.

- The following is a brief summary of the recommended changes:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a brief summary of the recommended changes including rationale for the changes to Policy 5.1812 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students – and Policy 5.1813 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students. (Once these policies are approved, then Policy 5.1811 – Student Code of Conduct Terms, will need to be updated to reflect the minor definitional changes and provide consistency between the policies.)

New Incident Codes

- Level 3 - # 57 – Physical Aggression on School Board Employee
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; Some of the physically aggressive acts by students were coded as a Level 4 Battery on School Board Employee EVEN THOUGH the staff member did not want to press charges against the student. The Level 4 code mandates a recommendation for expulsion. Many of these events required serious disciplinary consequences, but did not rise to the level of a recommendation for expulsion.
Example 1: Student pushes a teacher out of the way...teacher chooses not to press charges
Example 2: 3rd grade student pushes a teacher; The teacher presses charges; Mandatory expulsion *may not* be the most appropriate option for this student.
- Level 3 - # 67 – Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; several schools requested a Level 3 category to capture counterfeit money and other major incidents that didn't fit other categories.
- Level 4 - # 91 – Possession of a Handgun
Rationale: State requires reporting of handguns separately from firearms. A code for firearms currently exists. This code will allow schools to report weapons more accurately.

Revised Incident Code

- Level 1 - # 21 – Prohibited Items, non-criminal
Expand definition to include unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter mild pain medication without parent approval and school notification.
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; Though very similar language currently exists in the Level 3 - # 71 *Unauthorized Possession or Use of Prescription Medication*, concerns were expressed about the mandatory 10-day suspension for legitimately using the over-the-counter medication, yet circumventing the school's process for medication. This addition allows Principals the discretion when evaluating an event of this type.

New Action Codes

- Prevention Consequences - # 13 – Parent/Guardian Contact by a Language Facilitator

Rationale: Provides a code for a parental contact by a language facilitator in the event of a language barrier.

- Early Intervention Consequences - # 25 – Referral to School CORE Team
Rationale: A code added after the policy was approved to assist in providing services for students through the school CORE Team.

- Disciplinary Consequences - # 50 – Alternative to Suspension for Student Misconduct
Rationale: A newly developed Alternative to Suspension program needs a separate code to distinguish it from the other Alternative to Suspension programs.

- Disciplinary Consequences - # 88 – Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance
Rationale: The discipline committee recommended a suspension code to address additional suspension days for non-completion of alternative to suspension programs.

Proposed Revisions to Elementary and Secondary Matrices of Incidents and Actions

- Many of the necessary minor adjustments to each of the matrices are comprised of oversights in the original policy as well as some recommended changes from the discipline committee. The majority of the adjustments address the addition of an “A” (Additional Actions) for some of the codes. The most significant change involves the elementary matrix consequences for Drug, Alcohol, and Tobacco violations. The original policy provided consequences (and alternatives to suspensions) identical to the secondary policy. However, the agencies involved in the Alternative to Suspension programs for Drugs, Alcohol, and Tobacco do not generally target younger children. Therefore, the consequences for the elementary matrix was adjusted as follows:

1st Offense Drug or Alcohol (Codes 71-75 ONLY) Students may be given an opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

Repeated Drug or Alcohol Violation REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School suspension AND Recommendation for Expulsion.

1st Offense Tobacco Violation – REQUIRE a mandatory 1-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory counseling materials.

2nd Offense Tobacco Violation – REQUIRE a mandatory 3-day Out-of-School Suspension and mandatory in-school intervention.

3rd Offense Tobacco Violation – Students may be given as opportunity to attend a district approved alternative elementary program in addition to the mandatory 5-day Out-of-School Suspension.

Repeated Tobacco Violations REQUIRE a 10-day Out-of-School Suspensions.

Rationale: The Alternative to Suspension program providers target secondary students and are not prepared to address younger children. The Prevention Center has materials for the schools to utilize for elementary students as an alternative to suspension. The focus is on interventions and “getting help” rather than on purely punitive measures such as suspensions.

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8 I. Overview
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10 A. The matrix of incidents and actions which is found at the conclusion of this policy,
11 is a tool administrators will utilize to issue consequences for misbehavior by
12 secondary students. The purpose of the matrix is to create a consistent, district-wide
13 disciplinary system by identifying specific actions that correspond to a given
14 incident. Administrators will be able to reduce some of the subjectivity in their
15 decision-making and reference a district policy that requires minimum mandatory
16 consequences. These district-required minimum actions will assist administrators in
17 communicating with parents, students, staff, and school personnel regarding
18 discipline issues.

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20 B. If the matrix of incidents and actions is utilized effectively and consistently, the
21 focus of the discipline data generated should shift from the consequences of
22 students' behavior and move toward the behaviors that result in those
23 consequences. For example, instead of focusing on the number of suspensions, we
24 would begin to address the incidents that generate those suspensions. Schools
25 would then explore opportunities to implement programs/ initiatives/ strategies and
26 then would provide assistance for school staff. **In those schools with in-school**
27 **suspension programs (ISS), the Board's policy is that ISS should be used as the**
28 **suspension consequence for any incidents referring to "out of school suspension."**

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30 II. Using the Matrix
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32 A. When a student commits an infraction, the misbehavior is classified according to the
33 definition(s) that best describe the event. The action(s) to be taken by the
34 administrator are outlined in the matrix of incidents and actions. To identify the
35 appropriate action(s), locate the cells found at the intersection of the incident (rows)

1. The School Board of Palm Beach County recognizes that the matrix of incidents and actions must be construed to be consistent with the Individuals with Disability Education Act ("IDEA") and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act ("Section 504"). Therefore, students eligible for services under the IDEA or Section 504, will be disciplined in accordance with these Acts and are governed by those School Board policies which specify that they apply to students covered under IDEA and 504.

36 and action codes which are identified by the numbers at the top of the column. The
37 actions represented by the codes are listed in the box to the right of the matrix.
38 Minimum mandatory consequences (actions which MUST be imposed as a
39 minimum consequence for first time offenses) are indicated by an "X." Additional
40 consequences (those actions from which an administrator MAY ADDITIONALLY
41 choose to impose for more serious or repeated actions) are indicated by an "A."
42 Mandatory actions (those actions which MUST be imposed) are indicated by an
43 "M." By providing a minimum mandatory consequence with additional options for
44 all of the incidents, an administrator can address the severity of the incident with the
45 actions imposed.

420 some veiled reference or ambiguous or inconclusive evidence
421 pointing to the possibility; an allusion to a book or movie that
422 shows the planning of a violent act, or a vague, general statement
423 about the availability of weapons; there may be a specific
424 statement seeking to convey that the threat is not empty: "I'm
425 serious!" or "I really mean this!"

426 **Code 47 Severe or Repetitive Inappropriate Activity**

427 Any Level 2-type activity that is disruptive and/or inappropriate
428 in a school setting that does not fit into another Level 2 category.

429
430 C. Level 3

431 1. Crimes Against Persons Incidents

432 a. Code 50 **Fighting**

433 Mutual participation in a hostile, physical encounter; mutual
434 participation in an altercation involving physical violence.

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436 b. Code 51 **Verbal Assault on a Student/Person (Non-School Board**
437 **Employee)**

438 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to
439 another person, coupled with an apparent ability to do so, and
440 doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in another person
441 that violence is imminent.

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443 c. Code 52 **Verbal Assault on School Board Employee**

444 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to
445 a school board employee, coupled with an apparent ability to do
446 so, and doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in another
447 person that violence is imminent.
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- d. Code 53 **Physical Battery on a Student/Person (Non-School Board Employee)**
The willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the person of another. Three primary elements must be present for a Battery to occur: (1) there must be an aggressor, who (2) intended to cause physical harm, to (3) an another person. Includes an attack with a weapon that fits the aforementioned description. (**Note:** *This* category should be used only when the attack is serious enough to warrant contacting law enforcement.)
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- e. Code 54 **To Attempt a Criminal Act Against a Person**
Any person who attempts to commit, or who solicits another to commit, or who agrees, conspires, combines, or confederates with another person or persons to commit the offense of a Battery, Robbery, Homicide, Kidnapping, or Sexual Battery against another person or persons, and in such attempt does any act toward the commission of such offense, but fails in the perpetration or is intercepted or prevented in the execution of the offense. (Florida Statutes § 774.04)
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- f. Code 55 **Extortion/Blackmail/Coercion**
The use or threat or intimidation to obtain anything of value from another person, including, but not limited to, money. (**Note:** Minor offenses that do NOT require law enforcement should be coded as **Code 17 Bullying** or **Code 32 Repetitive Bullying, Harassing, Intimidating, or Threatening Behavior.**)
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- g. Code 56 **Robbery**
The taking or attempting to take anything of value that is owned by another person or organization, under confrontational circumstances by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. A key difference between robbery and larceny is that a threat of battery is involved in robbery.
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- h. Code 57 Physical Aggression on a School Board Employee**
A volitional, physically-aggressive act such as pushing, pulling, or striking toward a School Board employee. Generally, the physical act does not result in injury. Law enforcement should be notified; criminal charges may or may not be filed. (NOTE: IF A RECOMMENDATION FOR EXPULSION IS PROPOSED, then the Level 4 code # 96, Battery on SBE, should be used.

493 a. Code 60 **Stealing More than Fifty Dollars (\$50)**
494 The unlawful taking or concealing the property of another person,
495 without threat, violence or bodily harm, with the intent to prevent
496 or deprive the rightful owner of its use. This includes taking of
497 property or taking property from a vehicle on school property.
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499 b. Code 61 **Vandalism More than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) (Includes**
500 **Materials and Labor)**
501 The willful and/or malicious destruction, damage, or defacement
502 of public or private property, real or personal, without the consent
503 of the owner or the person having custody or control of it. This
504 category, which includes graffiti, should be coded when the
505 amount of damage to the property, including materials and labor,
506 exceeds one hundred dollars (\$100) to repair, remove, and/or
507 replace. (**NOTE:** If the damage to the property, including materials
508 and labor, is less than one hundred dollars (\$100). to repair, then
509 the event should be coded as **Code 35 Abuse of School**
510 **Property/Minor Vandalism** unless Law Enforcement files charges.)
511
512 c. Code 62 **Breaking and Entering/Burglary (Illegal Entry into a Facility)**
513 The unlawful entry with or without force into a building or other
514 structure, remaining behind or conveyance with the intent to
515 commit a crime to property.
516
517 d. Code 63 **Computer Misuse/Inappropriate Use of E-mail/Internet**
518 The inappropriate use of a computer, including, but not limited
519 to, breaking into restricted accounts or networks, modifying, or
520 destroying files without permission, illegally copying software,
521 and entering or distributing or printing unauthorized files.
522 Accessing or entering unauthorized internet sites; Distributing
523 inappropriate electronic messages.
524
525 e. Code 64 **Reckless Vehicle Use**
526 The use of any motorized or self-propelled vehicle on school
527 grounds in a reckless manner or so as to threaten the health,
528 safety, welfare of others, or to disrupt the educational process.
529
530 f. Code 65 **Motor Vehicle Theft**

531 The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. *Examples:* theft of
532 a car, truck, motorcycle, golf cart, dune buggy, RV or anything
533 that is self-propelled.
534

535 g. Code 66 **Arson**

536 To willfully and unlawfully, or while in the commission of any
537 felony, by fire or explosion, damage or cause to be damaged: any
538 dwelling, whether occupied or not, or its contents; any structure,
539 or contents thereof, where persons are normally present; and any
540 other structure that the person knew or had reasonable grounds to
541 believe was occupied by a human being (Florida Statutes §
542 806.01(1)(a)-(c)).
543

544 h. Code 67 Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident

545 To fashion or reproduce a document, money, or other items
546 with the intent to defraud; includes counterfeit money or
547 documents; Also, any Level 3-type incident that is inappropriate
548 in a school setting and does not fit into another Level 3 category.
549 Included in this category is culpable negligence, exposing
550 another person to personal injury. (NOTE: Any incident in this
551 category REQUIRES law enforcement intervention.)
552

553 3. Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Incidents

554 a. Code 70 **Possession/Use of Tobacco Products**

555 Possession, use, sale, storage, or distribution of tobacco products
556 on school district property. Tobacco products include, but are not
557 limited to, cigarettes, cigars, snuff, dip, pipe tobacco, and chewing
558 tobacco.
559

560 b. Code 71 **Unauthorized Possession or Use of Prescription Medication**

561 To possess, use, store, or be under the influence of any substance
562 which requires a physician's prescription, or any over-the-counter
563 medication without parental approval and school notification.
564

565 c. Code 72 **Use of Intoxicants**

566 The inhaling or ingestion of intoxicants, including but not limited
567 to, glue, solvents, butane, and whip crème, for the purpose of
568 obtaining a mood-modifying experience.
569

570 d. Code 73 **Possession, Use, Manufacture, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of**
571 **Alcohol or Intoxicating Beverages**

572 The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture,
573 sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of intoxicating
574 alcoholic beverages. Use should be reported only if the person is
575 caught in the act of using, or is discovered to have used in the
576 course of the investigation.
577

578 e. Code 74 **Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of Drug**
579 **Paraphernalia**

580 To possess, use, sale, store, or distribute any equipment, device,
581 or equipment used for the purpose of preparing or taking drugs,
582 including, but not limited to, items listed in Florida Statute §
583 893.145, and items which may be determined to be drug
584 paraphernalia under the criteria set out in Florida Statute §
585 893.146.
586

587 f. Code 75 **Possession, Use, or Storage of Drugs or Imitation Drugs**
588 **Represented as Drugs**

589 To store, possess, purchase, use, or be under the influence of any
590 mood-modifying substance and/or dangerous substance listed in
591 Chapter 893, Florida Statutes, including, but not limited to,
592 marijuana, hallucinogens, inhalants, as well as any substance
593 represented to be an illegal substance, such as “designer drugs,”
594 or caffeine pills, tablets, or caplets, or any substance which is
595 represented to be any such substance while on school property or
596 jurisdiction of the School District of Palm Beach County.
597

598
599 4. Disorderly Conduct/Weapons
600

601 a. Code 80 **Disruption of a School Function/Disorderly Conduct**

602 Any act which substantially disrupts the orderly conduct of a
603 school function, behavior which substantially disrupts the orderly
604 learning environment or poses a threat to the health, safety, and/or
605 welfare of students, staff, or others. An incident of this type is
606 mandatory to be reported to law enforcement and is likely to
607 result in an arrest.
608

609 b. Code 81 **Trespassing**

610 To enter or remain on a public school campus, school board
611 facility, or at a school function without authorization or invitation
612 and with no lawful purpose for entry, including students under
613 suspension or expulsion. To enter or remain on a public school

- 614 campus, school board facility, or at a school district sponsored
615 activity without authorization after being directed to leave by the
616 chief administrator/designee of the facility, campus, or function.
617
- 618 c. Code 82 **False Fire/911 Call**
619 Whoever, without reasonable cause, by outcry or the ringing of
620 bells, or otherwise makes or circulates, or causes to be made or
621 circulated, a false alarm of fire or 911 call.
622
- 623 d. Code 83 **Bomb Threat**
624 Intentionally making a false report to any person, including school
625 personnel, concerning the placement of any bomb, dynamite,
626 explosive, or arson-causing device.
627
- 628 e. Code 84 **Inappropriate, Lewd or Obscene Act**
629 The use of oral or written language, electronic messages, pictures,
630 objects, gestures, or engaging in any physical act considered to be
631 offensive, socially unacceptable, or not suitable for an educational
632 setting. Included in this category are indecent exposure (exposure
633 of private body parts to the sight of another person in a lewd or
634 indecent manner in a public place), and obscenity (conduct which
635 by the community standards is deemed to corrupt public morals
636 by its indecency and/or lewdness such as phone calls or other
637 communication; unlawful manufacture, publishing, selling,
638 buying or possessing materials such as literature or photographs).
639
- 640 f. Code 85 **Sexual Misconduct**
641 Engaging in a sex act or physical conduct of a sexual nature; the
642 unlawful sexual intercourse, sexual contact or other unlawful
643 behavior or conduct intended to result in sexual gratification
644 without force or threat and where the victim is capable of giving
645 consent.
646
- 647 g. Code 86 **Possession of a Knife**
648 The possession of any knife that may inflict harm on another
649 person, or could be used to intimidate another person, including,
650 but not limited to, fixed blade knives, folding knives, switch blade
651 knives, razor knives, box cutters. (**Note:** If a weapon is used
652 during an incident, that incident should be coded including an
653 appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry AND
654 disciplinary action may increase substantially.)
655

656 h. Code 87 **Possession of Other Potentially Dangerous Items**
657 Any instrument or object, other than firearms, handguns, or
658 knives, that could be deliberately used to inflict harm on another
659 person, or could be used to intimidate any person. Included in
660 this category are BB-guns and toy or replica guns represented as
661 real guns. Also, included in this category are the possession or
662 storage of items which are prohibited at school, including, but not
663 limited to ammunition clips, bullets or cartridges, flammable
664 liquids, combustible materials, matches, lighters, poisonous
665 substances, mace, pepper spray, and any other items which may
666 result in injury. (**Note:** If a weapon is used during an incident, that
667 incident should be coded including an appropriate corresponding
668 weapons-related entry AND disciplinary action may increase
669 substantially.)
670

671 FS **Felony Suspension Act**
672 This incident code should be used for a student who has been
673 felony suspended per Florida Statute, and is assigned to an
674 alternative program until the student is adjudicated. If the student
675 is adjudicated guilty, the principal may recommend expulsion.

678 1. Criminal Incidents

680 a. Code 9089 **Threat of Violence, High Level**
681 High level of threat is a threat that appears to pose an imminent
682 and serious danger to the safety of others; the threat is direct,

685 indicating that the threatener has acquired or practiced with a
686 weapon or has had the victim under surveillance.

695 device; or any machine gun. The term firearm does not include an
696 antique firearm unless the antique firearm is used in the
697 commission of a crime. (**Note:** Florida Statute § 790.001(6)). A

698 destructive device is any bomb, grenade, mine, rocket, missile,
699 pipe bomb, or similar device containing some type of explosive
700 that is designed to explode and is capable of causing bodily harm
701 or property damage (Florida Statute § 790.001(4)). (Note: If a
702 weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be coded
703 including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry.)

704
705 **c. Code 91 Possession of a Handgun**
706 **Possession or sale of a handgun on school property, school-**
707 **sponsored transportation, or during a school-sponsored activity.**
708 **(NOTE: If a handgun is used during an incident, that incident**
709 **should be coded including an appropriate corresponding**
710 **weapons-related entry.)**

711
712 **d. Code 92 Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of an Explosive**
713 **Device (Not Firecrackers, Poppers)**

714 An explosive is any chemical compound or mixture that has the
715 property of yielding readily to combustion or oxidation upon
716 application of heat, flame, or shock, including but not limited to
717 dynamite, nitroglycerin, trinitrotoluene, or ammonium nitrate
718 when combined with other ingredients to form an explosive
719 mixture, blasting caps, and detonators (Florida Statute
720 §790.001(5)). **Note:** If an explosive device is used during an
721 incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate
722 corresponding weapons-related entry.)

723
724 **e. Code 93 Sale, Possession With Intent to Sell or Distribute, or**
725 **Distribution of Drugs, Imitation Drugs Represented as Drugs, or**
726 **Prescription Medications**

727 To sell or distribute any mood-modifying substance and/or
728 dangerous **substance listed in Chapter 893, Fla. Stat., including,**
729 **but not limited to marijuana, hallucinogens,** inhalants, as well as
730 any substance represented to be an illegal substance, such as
731 "designer drugs." or caffeine pills, tablets, or caplets, or any
732 substance which is represented to be any such substance while on
733 school district property, school transportation, or at a school
734 related function.

735
736 **f. Code 94 Aggravated Battery**

737 Intentionally or knowingly causing great bodily harm, permanent
738 disability, or permanent disfigurement or using a deadly weapon
739 while committing a battery. A battery is the actual and intentional

740 touching or striking of another person against his or her will or
741 intentionally causing bodily harm to an individual (Florida Statute
742 §§ 784.03 & 784.045).

743
744 f. g. Code 95 **Armed Robbery**

745 The taking of money or other property which may be the subject
746 of larceny from the person or custody of another, with intent to
747 either permanently or temporarily deprive the person or the
748 owner of the money or other property, when in the course of the
749 taking there is the use of force, violence, assault, or putting in fear;
750 with the use of a firearm or other deadly weapon (Florida Statute
751 §§ 812.13(1) & (2)(a)).

752
753 g. h. Code 96 **Battery or Aggravated Battery on a School Board Employee**

754 A battery or aggravated battery, as defined above, on any elected
755 official or school district employee whether it is committed on
756 school property, on school sponsored transportation, during a
757 school sponsored activity or while the elected official or
758 employee is on official school business. (Florida Statute § 231.06).

759
760
761 h. i. Code 97 **Sexual Battery (Attempted or Actual Forcible Penetration)**

762 Forced oral, anal, or vaginal penetration by, or union with, the
763 sexual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of
764 another by any other object. (Florida Statute § 794.011(1)(h))

765
766 i. j. Code 98 **Kidnapping or Abduction**

767 Forcibly, secretly, or by threat, confining, abducting, or
768 imprisoning another person against their will and without lawful
769 authority.

770
771 j. k. Code 99 **Homicide - Murder**

772 The unlawful killing of a human being (Florida Statute § 782.04);
773 and manslaughter - the killing of a human being by the act,
774 procurement, or culpable negligence of another, without lawful
775 justification (Florida Statute § 782.07).
