4-A I recommend the Board adopt the proposed revisions to Policy 8.122, entitled "Textbooks and Related Instructional Materials."

Adoption CONSENT ITEM

- This revision is consistent with the adoption of a separate Policy on textbook accountability (Policy 8.1225, adopted on Jan. 13, 2003). This Policy incorporates and supersedes content from Directive 8.123, as well as including updates reflecting the January 7, 2003, effective date of the new K-20 Education Code.
- Development notices were published Nov. 25, 2002 and Jan. 6, 2003. The Adoption notice was published on Feb. 24, 2003.
- As requested by the Board on Feb. 17, this version includes the provision that the Board will be notified at the next meeting if the Superintendent makes a determination to waive the requirement of providing a textbook and/or other instructional material to each student in non-core courses. Lines 21-22.

PROPOSED REVISIONS TO POLICY 8.122

TEXTBOOKS AND RELATED INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

1 1. Textbooks

- Adequate Instructional Materials.-- The School Board will provide adequate 2 1. textbooks and other instructional materials in accordance with state law and State 3 4 Board of Educational Rules. Instructional materials, as defined by Fla. Stat. § 5 1006.29(4) [233.07(4)], are "items having intellectual content that by design serve as 6 a major tool for assisting in the instruction of a subject or course. These items may 7 be available in bound, unbound, kit, or package form and may consist of hardbacked 8 or softbacked textbooks, consumables, learning laboratories, manipulatives, 9 electronic media, and computer courseware or software. The term does not include 10 electronic or computer hardware even if such hardware is bundled with software or other electronic media, nor does it include equipment or supplies." 11
- 12a. As stated in Fla. Stat. § 1006.28(1) [230.23(7)], "The term 'adequate13instructional materials' means a sufficient number of textbooks or sets of14materials serving as the basis for instruction for each student in the core15courses of mathematics, language arts, social studies, science, reading, and16literature, except for instruction for which the school advisory council approves17the use of a program that does not include a textbook as a major tool of18instruction."
- 19b. The Superintendent or Board may determine when to waive the requirement of20providing a textbook and/or other instructional material to each student in non-21core courses. In cases where the Superintendent makes the determination to22waive the requirement, the Board shall be informed at the next Board meeting.
- <u>c. Any decision by a school to use class sets or not to issue textbooks or other</u>
 <u>instructional materials that are provided by the District on a one-per-student</u>
 <u>basis shall be communicated to parents and area superintendents. In all</u>
 <u>instances, District curricular staff and school staff shall ensure that students</u>
 <u>have adequate materials for both in-class study and homework arrangements.</u>
- Allocation.-- The annual allocation and expenditure of state funds for textbooks and the annual purchase of state adopted or non-state adopted materials shall be in accordance with Chapter 233 <u>1006</u>, <u>Part I.F</u>, Florida Statutes, and applicable State Board <u>of Education</u> Rules.
- a. Use of State Instructional Materials Allocation.-- <u>Absent a waiver from the DOE</u>
 or any applicable exemption under charter district status, at least only up to fifty

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- percent (50%) of the state allocation for textbooks shall may be used for the
 purchase of instructional materials <u>(including library and reference books and</u>
 <u>nonprint materials</u>) not on the state-adopted list <u>and for repair and renovation of</u>
 <u>textbooks and library books</u>, <u>pursuant to Fla. Stat. § 1006.40(3)(b)</u>.
- b. As stated in Fla. Stat. § 1006.40(3)(c), the District may use up to 100 percent of that portion of the annual allocation designated for the purchase of instructional materials for kindergarten, and 75 percent of that portion designated for the purchase of instructional materials for first grade, to purchase materials not on the state-adopted list.
- 43 C. Any portion of state allocated funds for textbooks not expended for textbooks or not otherwise designated by legislative authority for library/media materials shall 44 be expended on library and reference books and for the repair and renovation 45 However, Oof the remaining amount not 46 of textbooks and library books. otherwise earmarked for library/media materials or for book repair, expenditures 47 may be made for non-state adopted materials with the approval of the 48 49 Superintendent or designee, pursuant to established procedures issued annually by bulletin. 50
- 51d.Pursuant to procedures issued by bulletin annually, school centers and other
appropriate textbook users may requisition textbooks and ancillary instructional
materials prior to June 30 in accordance with prevailing statutory law and State
Board rules. Any request from a school center for use of the state or local
District allocation must be in accordance with state law and this Policy.
- 56b. The Superintendent shall establish and maintain the appropriate procedures57for the requisition, purchase, receipt, storage, distribution, use, conservation,58records and reports of, and management practices and property accountability59concerning instructional materials' use in school centers consistent with state60laws and other School Board Policies. [See section (6), below]
- 61 c. The Superintendent shall establish procedures consistent with state laws
 62 and rules for the selection and adoption of textbooks and ancillary instructional
 63 materials and shall have the authority to determine annually whether the District
 64 participates in the state pre-adoption process [See section (6), below; most of this
 65 former subsection will be covered by the separate Policy 8.1225.]
- 66 2. Accountability for and Protection of Instructional Materials
- 67 a. Principals and departmental personnel concerned are charged with the
 68 responsibility of the proper care of instructional materials, no matter whether on
 69 loan to pupils or in storage.

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- b. When distributed to students, such materials are merely loaned to students.
 Each parent, guardian or other person having charge of a pupil to whom or for
 whom materials have been issued will be held liable and will be required to pay for
 loss, destruction or unnecessary damage on a monetary schedule issued annually
 as part of the ordering procedures.
- c. When in storage in schools or central depositories, such materials are to be
 stored in a neat, orderly, and safe manner, preferably in sequence contained in the
 annual textbook inventory. All reasonable effort shall be made to protect materials
 against fire, flood, vermin, infestation, etc.
- Adoption and Continued Use of Instructional Materials... Instructional Materials
 selected for specific courses and grade levels as part of the district's curriculum shall
 have been reviewed by a School or District Instructional Materials Committee and
 approved by appropriate instructional personnel. Committees shall reflect prevailing
 appropriate state guidelines.
- 84 a. <u>Any request from a school center to use textbooks or other related instructional</u> 85 <u>materials as part of the curriculum and which are not District adopted, per se,</u> 86 <u>must be approved by the Superintendent or designee. Any request for funding</u> 87 <u>of such materials must be approved by the Superintendent or designee.</u> 88 <u>Specific procedures and authorization will be issued annually</u>.
- b. <u>The District adoption cycle for instructional materials shall coincide with the</u> state cycle except where a separate District adoption is deemed necessary.
 Adopted materials shall be used during the adoption cycle until physically unsuitable or until replaced with newly-adopted materials.
- 93 4. Inventories.-- Annual textbook inventories of District-adopted instructional materials
 94 shall be issued to schools and appropriate departments which shall serve as:
- 95 a. <u>the official District adoption listing of materials used in the District's curriculum;</u>
- b. <u>the inventory/summary of all curricular instructional materials for which a school</u>
 <u>center/department is responsible; and</u>
- 98 c. <u>the ordering form for the following school year's needs as provided by</u>
 99 <u>instructions/procedures issued annually.</u>
- 5. <u>Disposal.--</u> The district Textbook Depository shall arrange for the exchange of books among the various districts in accordance with state law or rule and shall maintain a public <u>lending or</u> "give-away" program of <u>for</u> obsolete or physically unsuitable materials <u>or those no longer on state contract, as stated in Fla. Stat.</u> <u>104</u> <u>1006.41, and no longer on the District's local adoption list or otherwise still officially</u> <u>in use in the District.</u> for the general public, qualified non-public schools, <u>governmental divisions, charitable organizations, and foreign countries as follows</u>:

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107 Giving or lending the materials to other public education programs within the a. 108 district or state, to the teachers to use in developing supplementary teaching materials, to students or others (including the general public or foreign 109 110 countries), or to any charitable organization, governmental agency, home 111 education students, private school, or state; or Selling the materials to used book dealers, recycling plants, pulp mills, or other 112 b. persons, firms, or corporations upon such terms as are most economically 113 114 advantageous to the district school board. All monies received by reason of sale, exchange or other disposition of 115 C. instructional materials shall be deposited in the District school fund and added 116 117 to the District appropriation for instructional materials 118 d. In the event that any instructional materials cannot be disposed of as provided 119 in subsections (a) or (b), the materials may be destroyed, using any reasonable 120 and safe method. 121 6. All state and/or district statutes, rules, policies and directives not expressly covered in tThis policy will be covered by periodically revisedions and/or supplemental 122 communiqués to be determined by and issued at the discretion of the 123 124 Superintendent as necessary to keep it current with the state law and rules which it supplements, although appropriate staff should be familiar with Fla. Stat.
