SUBJECT: FY1998 – FY2002 Advanced Placement (AP) Exam Results

The Advanced Placement (AP) exam is a cooperative educational endeavor between secondary schools and colleges/universities. There are 33 courses in 19 subject areas, offered by 14,000 secondary schools around the world. In 2002, 900,000 students took 1.6 million exams. The AP exam gives students an opportunity to take college-level courses and exams while still in high school, thereby providing a means for colleges to grant credit and/or placement to students who have applied themselves successfully.

Tables 1 and 2 contain information about the participation rate and percent passing for the School District of Palm Beach County (SDPBC), Florida, the Nation and the World (Global). Tables 3 and 4 contain the information by race/ethnicity/language groups, free/reduced lunch status, ESOL category, and ESE or non-ESE status of SDPBC seniors, as required by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. The data for some groups is not available for years prior to FY2001.

AP results from multiple years can reveal trends in the demographics of the test takers and their academic preparation, and can provide individual schools and districts with one way of self evaluation and self comparison. However, as indicated by the College Board (publisher of the AP), caution should be used in making comparisons between local, state, and global results. Results may differ because not all students in a high school, school district, or a state take the AP.

AP performance and participation is a Key Result for the SDPBC. An analysis of the AP exam results using the World Class method revealed the following:

Participation Rate

- ♦ In FY2002, there were 3,885 juniors and seniors in the SDPBC who took an AP exam.
- ♦ The FY2002 participation rates for all tested students, and for black, Hispanic, and white students continued an upward trend and were significantly higher than in FY1998.

Passing Rate

- In FY2002, the percent of AP Exams passed by SDPBC students (60%) was higher than Florida and lower than the Nation and Global.
- The FY2002 passing rate for black students was higher than in FY1998, while the passing rate for all tested students, Hispanic, and white students remained stable.

These results will be shared with appropriate staff members to provide direction for improvements in curriculum and instruction. Also, schools have received information about their AP exam test takers and will use this information in the school improvement planning process.
