SUBJECT: RELEASE OF FY18 SCHOOL EFFECTIVENESS QUESTIONNAIRE (SEQ) RESULTS

The School Effectiveness Questionnaire (SEQ) was administered from March to May 2018. The SEQ measures perceptions regarding the effectiveness of our District schools. For FY18, the District administered the Teacher/Staff version online for the eighth year. The SEQ provides important information to schools and the District to develop and sustain a Positive and Supportive School Climate and a High Performance Culture, which are central themes in the Strategic Plan. The categories for the SEQ were developed from the results of a factor analysis and a review of national school climate surveys. This year the district partnered with Florida Atlantic University (FAU) to complete the analysis and provide reports on each of the three SEQ surveys (staff, student and parent).

In support of the District Strategic Plan, items were added and/or revised to support and align with Strategic Themes, Objectives and Initiatives and as such, comparison to previous years should be made with caution. In addition, responses rates for some schools on Parent SEQ surveys are lower than ideal for definitive conclusions. Ideally, a school-level response rate at 75% or higher is desired.

QUESTIONNAIRE

Introduction

The School Effectiveness Questionnaire (SEQ) was administered from March to May 2018. The SEQ measures Teacher/Staff, Parent and Student's perceptions regarding the effectiveness of the District's schools. This instrument provides the opportunity to obtain, analyze, and evaluate data referencing a central theme in the Strategic Plan; to sustain a positive and supportive school climate. For FY18, the District administered the Teacher/Staff version online for the ninth year.²

History

Through an internal review of National School Climate Surveys and a subsequent factor analysis, effectiveness has been defined to include the following five dimensions: Instructional Leadership, High Expectations, School Climate, Decision Making, and Student Conduct³. Overtime, The Office of Research and Evaluation has amended items to improve the quality and reliability of its results.

FY18 Improvements

Historically, respondents were limited to a 6-point scale. Since FY17 resulted in an increase of individual items left blank, our FAU Project Team suggested to add "I Don't Know" as a 7th point. This could provide additional information that could potentially help determine if the blanks from FY17 was a function of a respondent not knowing how to respond.

The FY18 scale is as follows:

- 1-Strongly Agree
- 2-Moderately Agree
- 3-Agree
- 4-Disagree
- 5-Moderately Disagree
- 6-Strongly Disagree
- 7- I Don't Know

¹ In FY2011, a sixteen-member committee of school and central-office administrators revised the SEQ after a review of national school climate surveys and the District's need for more information related to issues affecting our schools.

² The District used a third-party purveyor to administer the teacher/staff version in order to reduce costs and ensure anonymity of respondents.

³ Survey items that are highly inter-correlated or loaded more closely together are supposed to measure the same construct or conceptual category. The average of these item responses composed a category score. This allows the categories to have statistical support. Category labels were taken from research literature related to the structure of school climate.

Additionally, an internal decision was made to include Diverse Community as a sixth dimension in evaluating effectiveness.

FY18 Limitations

In consideration of the survey enhancements, the FY18 report is limited in its ability to provide a longitudinal analysis of specific dimensions/items. Specifically, the adoption of a 7 point scale and item wording would require a need to reexamine the psychometrics of this survey. It is recommended that all changes to this survey are documented moving forward.

Suggested Use

In its current form, the SEQ can offer valuable information that can inform professional development needs of school site leadership teams and teachers. At the district level, it can be considered when allocating district resources for intervention strategies. Moreover, it is valuable data to consider while developing comprehensive school improvement initiatives.

Methodology

Data Cleaning: Preparation

- Any respondents included in the dataset but did not provide any responses (0 responses) were removed from the data set and not considered in the analysis.
- All responses of a 7(I Don't Know), were eliminated and considered as non-response (null) to calculate the overall positive response rates. However, this data can be used in the future to explore the knowledge of the respondents relative to each item.

Reverse Coding

The prepared data file was imported into IBM SPSS Statistics Software.

- All identified reversed questions (#61 & #62), as indicated on the survey with asterisks ("The percent positive response is a contrary indicator"), were transformed and a new variable was created (i.e. Q61REV).
- The REV variable was populated through transforming the original responses to its reciprocal, therefore: 1:6; 2:5; 3:4; 4:3; 5:2; 6:1; (7: Omit).
- A correlation analysis was completed for each item and subsequent REV variable to verify the process was completed correctly (r = -1).

Creating Dichotomies

To obtain the overall positive response rate for each survey dimension we dichotomized the scale to either positive or negative responses. To accomplish this task, we:

- Created a new means variable for respondent in each dimension by using the MEAN numeric expression being mindful of any reverse questions.
- Used the new mean variable to dichotomize the responses to agree verse disagree.
- One (1) was assigned to respondents with a resultant mean between 1 and 3.49, and a 0 was assigned to respondents with a resultant mean between 3.50 and 6.
- 1= Agree (positive); 0=Disagree (negative).

Findings

FY 18 Descriptive Statistics

- 495,718 valid item responses received.
- 1.3% (n=6336) of responses were left blank.
- 6.5% (n=32292) of the respondents did not know the answer to the question.

Overall Response Rates (Participation)

- The FY18 response rate for the District decreased overall by 13.5%.
- From FY17 to FY18, response rates at:

Elementary Schools: Down 11%
Middle Schools: Down 11%
High Schools: Down 13%

Percent Positive Responses

The percent positive responses are comprised of those responses on the SEQ Likert scales that denote agreement (strongly, moderately, or slightly agree), or the degree of concern for student conduct (where adverse conduct is a minor problem or not a problem). Positive response analysis for each item (and dimension) and excludes non-responses. "I Don't Know" was treated as a non-response.

Limitations

- This method gives a slight advantage to the frequency of respondents being labeled "positive" since conventional rounding accepts any resultant mean of 1-3.49 as a positive response.
- Since the survey has changed, there is little value in trend analysis therefore, historic data has been greyed.

Conclusions

- Overall positive response has improved by 3.6% and the highest since FY15.
- Improved slightly in High Expectations and School Climate.
- Improved by 4.2% in Decision Making.
- Considerable increase of 5.9% in Student Conduct and highest since FY15.
- Newly added dimension of Diverse Community had the highest % of all dimensions (See reliability).
- High Expectations, School Climate, and Student Conduct received best score since FY15.

School Level Percent Positive Responses

From FY17 to FY18, the school level percent positive responses:

- Elementary remained stable overall in Instructional Leadership, High Expectations, and School Climate. Decision making improved by 5.9% and Student Conduct improved by 5.4%.
- Middle School remained stable overall in Instructional Leadership, High Expectations, and Student Conduct. School Climate improved by 2.7% and 5.3% in Decision Making.
- High School improved 7.5% in Student Conduct, but declined overall by: 3.8% in Instructional Leadership, 2.6% in High Expectations, 2.6% in School Climate, and 2.7% in Decision Making.
- All levels have shown little improvement in Student Conduct since FY15.
- All levels have shown little progress in including staff in the decision-making process.

To confirm our results, we validated the source data using 5% of the recorded high schools, middle schools, and elementary schools.

• For the staff survey, we validated the results for 1 of the 23 High Schools (Boynton Beach High), two 2 of the 33 Middle Schools (Omni Middle and L.C. Swain Middle), and 5 of the 109 Elementary Schools (Egret Lake Elementary, Hidden Oaks Elementary, Jupiter Elementary, JC Mitchell Elementary, and Starlight Cove Elementary).
