Old Business	<p>Mental Health Committee – Dr. Seth Bernstein informed that their next meeting is on Tuesday, January 16th from 10:30 – 12:00 pm at the MHA. There was an issue with kids that were being Backer Acted from the south end, they were being funneled through South County Mental Health Center and they have limited space for kids. Through the Transportation Plan they can now be directly transported to JFK North Campus and bypass SCMHC.</p> <p>They reviewed data about the number of youth BA’s during the summer, the trend went down. They received updates from the mobile crisis teams. They looked at trends data to see if there were areas of the County where there are more mental health crisis and how to do more education on mental health issues to avoid BAs. Also talked about the Birth to 22 efforts around the County. There is a Trauma Informed Work Group Action Team that meets every other month. They are doing an assessment of the trauma informed trainings that are happening and the trauma informed work that is being offered to those in the community, including those from hurricane torn areas. There is a sold out free training with a psychiatrist from Israel next week.</p> <p>Rick Lewis informed that they still have YMHFA trainings on January 25th, January 26th, and February 7th. Contact Rick for more information. Dr. Bernstein stated that there is a RFQ, looking for a consultant to help design a collective impact for behavioral health. There was a needs assessment done on behavioral health needs of children and adults through the Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network, that data is being reviewed. There is a need to develop an initiative around behavioral health. 	<p>Relief. They are looking forward to collaborating with the Hunger Relief Coalition. They have created a collaborative team internally in the District and will be meeting for the second time on January 23rd. They have created a SharePoint site where information will be available for the school principals and also creating a hub of information for the program. The Task force meeting created a resource expo and it was very successful. It is divided into two sessions, anyone interested please contact Paula. There are 22 tables from 8:00–8:25 am and from 10:35-11:00 am at no cost.</p> <p>CDC Grant Advisory Committee – Pete Stewart informed that they had their meeting today. They spoke about the CDC Grant. The School Health Profile survey is now being administered to principals and lead health teachers. It collects information on policy implementation at the schools as well as other health related issues. We should have it back beginning in March and the data back over the summer. They updated the curriculum that was from Kindergarten to 9th grade and expanded it to include 10th, 11th and 12th grades. The Youth Empowerment Summit is on January 25th, COMPASS has been their host for the past two years. The Norton Museum will have a tour of the museum relating to LGBT artists. The LGBTQ Critical Support Guide which provides issue related to LGBTQ students has been approved, now available on our Gender Study web page and in print being sent out to the schools administration. It talks about various issues: bathroom use, locker rooms, field trips, graduation ceremonies, etc. They have their State Conference “All together Now” on February 1st, and 2nd at USF in St. Pete. Palm Beach County is working with Broward and Miami Dade on this conference that talks specifically about LGBT policies in schools as well as the curriculum and teacher’s training coming up the last two weeks of January.</p> <p>School Health Services Report – Brenda Galie informed that the State mandates that 45% of health screenings should be completed by December 31st. Although difficult to reschedule all the students that missed their screenings due to the hurricane, they were able to complete 50% of the vision and hearing screenings required for Kindergarten, 1st, 3rd and 6th grades. They have completed 53,000 vision and hearing screenings to meet that goal.</p>	
<p>New Business:</p> <p>“2017 Youth Risk Behavioral Survey Results”</p>	<p>“2017 Youth Risk Behavioral Survey Results” - Pete Stewart informed that the 2017 Youth Risk Behavioral Survey Results data will be available at www.CDC.gov soon. The data can be looked up nationally, by state, by local education agency and can compare any two areas or one area for two different years. The CDC report “Morbidity and Mortality” looked at the YRBS 2005 – 2015 and nationally the trends for teens ever having had sex has gone down nationally as well as locally.</p> <p>For the 2017 YRBS, they surveyed students in 7th and 8th grades in all of their high schools. Some Districts in some States do a sample, some of the schools are randomly selected. They do a census at every public, middle and high school, and the last two or three surveys they also included their alternative education sites. The surveys are pencil and paper, not computerized and are anonymous. Every year since 1999 they collected enough surveys to</p>	

	<p>be able to have weighted data, which means that the information they get can be extrapolated to all public schools students in 7th, 8th grade and 9th thru 12th grade. The questions are a little different in middle school than high school, but most of the questions do match up. The YRBS is part of the Surveillance System that they look at to examine behaviors that are the leading causes of morbidity and mortality. Includes, unintended injuries, tobacco use, alcohol and other drug use, sexually behaviors which may result in HIV infections, STDs or unintended pregnancy, weight management and physical activities. From high schools they had 100% response rate, 76% from their high school students; middle schools very similar a 100 % response rate, 83% students' response rate.</p> <p>The data is broken down by total number, grades, race, male/female and ethnic brake down. If the question states it is within the last 30 days the CDC considers it current. The YRBS Survey started nationally in 1991, in the PBC District they started in 1997. Not every students gets the survey, they are randomly picked from different classes.
